Agnes Cagesbie married John Lovatt at Bunny 10.11.1597.

CANTERELL

Alice Canterell married William Baker of Hickling at Bunny 31.5.1589.

CAPPS

Edward Capps married to Jean, living in Bradmore 1650s.

Margaret Capps bapt. Bunny 21.10.1654, daughter of Edward and Jean of Bradmore.

Mary Capps bapt. Bunny 27.1.1657, daughter of Edward and Jean of Bradmore.

William Capps bapt. Bunny 3.3.1659, son of Edward and Jean.

Edward Capps bapt. Bunny 6.4.1660, son of Edward and Jean.

CARRINGTON

Thomas Carrington married Elizabeth Egglestone, both of Bradmore, at Bunny 24.6.1804, banns read on 10th, 17th and 24th June.

Elizabeth Carrington born c1805, buried Bunny 17.12.1823 age 18, possibly daughter of Thomas and Elizabeth.

William Carrington born 1823/4, buried Bunny 1.2.1824, infant, possibly son of Thomas and Elizabeth, or son of Elizabeth junior.

John Carrington born c1856 Cotgrave, son of John ag.lab and Catherine brother of George (born 1859, resident in Bunny 1881 with wife Mary and children George and Mary born Tollerton). 1861 age 7 with parents at Cotgrave. 1871 age 17 farm servant in house of William Hamson, waggoner, at Cotgrave. 1881 not found. On Bradmore electoral roll with house 1886-7. 1891 age 36 ag.lab with wife Rebecca age 36 and daughter Mary 11 scholar at Holme Pierrepoint. 1901 age 46, gen.lab, with wife Rebecca and grand-daughter Edith A Carrington age 4, born Radcliffe on Trent, and a boarder at Station Terrace, Radcliffe on Trent. 1911 age 58, ag.lab, with wife Rebecca, daughter Mary and grand-daughter Winifred age 9 scholar born Radcliffe on Trent, at 17 Station Terrace, Radcliffe on Trent, 4 rooms.

Rebecca Carrington, born c1856, Cropwell Butler, nee Wilford, daughter of George, ag.lab and Sarah of Cropwell Butler. Married John Carrington Apr.qtr. 1875, Bingham district. 1891 age 36, married to John. 1901 age 46, married to John. 1911 age 58, married 36 years with 2 children.

Sarah Wilford Carrington born 22.8.1877 Bunny, bapt. Bradmore Methodist Church 17.6.1885, daughter of John and Rebecca. Methodist Sunday School scholar 3rd class, intermittent attendances 5 July – 23 Aug 1885, sick 25 Oct – 8 Nov 1885, attended 25.4.1886-27.6.1886, 18-25.7.1886 and 3.10.1886. 1891 Sarah age 14, dom. servant for Robert Hartley, baker, grocer and confectioner, and family at 1 Nelson St., Long Eaton. 1901 age 23, dom. svt for Frank Taylor, University Maths scholar and family at 263 Woodborough Rd., Nottingham.

Mary Carrington born 18.3.1880 Bunny, bapt. Bradmore Methodist Church 17.6.1885, daughter of John and Rebecca. Methodist Sunday School scholar 4th class, intermittent attendances Jul-Dec 1885, attended 30.5.1886-8.8.1886. 1891 age 11, scholar in parent's house at Holme Pierrepoint. 1901 age 21 dom. servant for William Richards and wife, on own means, at Cropwell Road, Radcliffe on Trent. 1911 age 31 single, domestic servant, in parents' house at Radcliffe on Trent.

Annie Carrington born c1877, contemporary of Sarah Carrington. Methodist Sunday School scholar 3rd class 5.7.1885-3.8.1885, 23.5.1886-15.8.1886, 3 Oct – 5 Dec 1886 intermittently.

John Carrington, born c1877, contemporary of Sarah Carrington. Methodist Sunday School scholar 3rd class intermittent attendances 5 July – 23 Aug 1885, attended 28.3.1886-8.8.1886, 17 Oct – 14 Nov 1886, noted left.

CARTWRIGHT

Robert Cartwright husbandman, churchwarden, 1641 took Protestation Oath supporting true Protestant Religion. (Also Robert junior, who is not necessarily Robert senior's son - see below). Left a will dated 19.4.1666, probate 9.8.1666. Willed to be buried at Bunny. Left to Robert Cartwright his natural son £40. To Mary Ackenson his maid a yard of flaxxon cloth to make her apron. The residue to his wife Mary, his executrix.

Robert Cartwright junior, natural son of Robert senior, 1666 received bequest in Robert senior's will. If he is the same Robert referred to in Mary Cartwright's will of 1668, as under 21 at that date, then he is not the Robert junior who took the Protestation Oath in 1641.

Mary Cartwright, nee Hornbuckle, widow (presumably of Robert who died 1666), made her will 28.4.1668. She left to brother William Hornbuckle one young lamb, and three coats and waistcoats and

their linings. To John Smith of Boney, one young lamb. To her servant John Dawson 1/-. To her shepherd John Wilson 1/-. To her maidservant Anne Hallond an apron, a pair of stockings and 1/-. To Ellin Tomson of Bradmore one blue coate. To Elizabeth Carnum? of Bradmore a coat and a waistcoat. To Elizabeth Hopwell of Bradmore a green apron. Her son Robert Cartwright, under 21 at that time, was in the guardianship of Gabrielle Blatherwicke of ?Booroakering, Co Nottm. If Robert died before age 21, the estate would go to Gabrielle and to William Hornbuckle (possibly the William Hornbuckle who married Alice Chamberlain of Bradmore 14.4.1637).

William Cartwright bapt. at Bunny 22.5.1660 son of Rob and Mary, possibly died before 1666 when Robert made his will.

William Cartwright paid the Bradmore Constable £4/1/6 in 1821, £4 in 1822, £3 in 1823/4. On 1.1.1824 the Constable paid 1/- for warrant indorsing for William Cartwright.

CARVER

Sarah Carver married John Davis both of Bradmore at Bunny 24.11.1794.

Edward Carver, born 1804 Nottingham, hatter of Nottingham, 1835 listed as trustee of Bradmore Methodist Church in original deeds and also in 1868 deeds. 1837 Poll Book, Edward Carver at Pelham St., Nottingham. 1851 Edward Carver age 47 hatter and furrier master, born Nottingham, with wife Hellen age 45, daughter Julia S Quintin Carver age 5 and 2 servants at 16 Pelham St., Nottingham. 1855 Jan.qtr. Hellen Carver died, Nottingham. 1861 Edward Carver age 56 hatter employing 2 men with daughter Julia S Q Carver age 15 scholar, a visitor and 3 servants, at Pelham St., Nottingham. Edward Carver born 1804 died Oct.qtr. 1870, Basford district.

CHADBURN

Walter J Chadburn born 1881 Mansfield Woodhouse, son of William, shepherd, and Elizabeth. 1891 age 12 scholar in parents' house at Rempstone. 1901 Walter Chadburn age 21 herdsman, boarder with William Button at The Green, Ruddington. 1903 Jan. qtr. Walter Chadburn married Florence Annie Hickling, Basford district. 1911 Walter Chadburn age 31, herdsman on farm, with wife Florence Annie age 29 and son Leslie William age 7 at Riby, Lincolnshire. On electoral roll for Far St., no local vote, spring 1923, then for Farmer St., full vote, autumn 1923-1939/40 and probably to 1944 (roll not printed during war years). Married to Florence Annie. 1923 invited to become Methodist Sunday School teacher. 1923-4 paid seat rent, Methodist chapel. 1925 Kellys Directory, Walter Chadburn farm bailiff to C W Worth Esq. In directories for 1928, 1932, 1936 and 1941 Walter is recorded as farmer. 1930s at Rufford Lodge site, Farmer St., noted in Morrismen booklet. Methodist local preacher (Source: G Randall). Died age 64, buried 30.12.1944.

Florence Annie Chadburn, nee Hickling, born 20.7.1881, Ruddington, daughter of Joseph and Ada. 1903 Jan qtr, Basford district, married to Walter. 1911 age 29, married 8 years with 1 child, with Walter at Riby, Lincs. On electoral roll, Farmer St, autumn 1923-1956, Rufford Lodge site, listed as Blackcliffe Farm May 1945-52. Paid seat rent, Methodist chapel 1925-1934. Listed as WI member 1931-1939. Florence Annie Chadburn died March qtr. 1971.

Leslie William Chadburn, born 1904, Ruddington, son of Walter and Florence Annie. 1911 age 7, scholar in parents' house at Riby, Lincs.

CHALLANDS

GRANDAD (WILLIAM) CHALLANDS by Dorothy Sewell, From Nottinghamshire Countryside vol.19 No.3 Autumn 1958 (6d). Copy provided by Sylvia Hayler.

"I have memories of many a school holiday visit to my maternal grandparents at Bradmore, a tiny village in Nottinghamshire, in their dear little Rose Cottage. Yet it seems that only now when they are no longer there to visit, have I come to really know them. The reason for this is the many stories I have been told about my grandparents, both by my mother and aunts.

"Grandma Challands had 15 children - a large family even for those days. I remember her as always being calm and dignified - and never without a lace choker-collar. But it is Grandad who has been the centre of all those delightful stories I've been hearing ever since he died in 1941, at the age of 85.

He was what is usually called a fine figure of a man, well over 6 ft tall, thick grey hair, long old-fashioned sideboards and grey eyes that for ever twinkled down at one. For Grandad Challands was a character! For over 50 years he worked on Mr Smeaton's farm. He earned 18/- a week, rising to 21/-. But apart from that, he was a jobbing gardener, chimney sweep and village barber. The big farms around used to employ farm hands from outside Bradmore and they, as well as the men of the village, used to come to Rose Cottage for their haircuts. My mother has often told me how, after the customer had had his hair cut and asked: "How much, Mr Challands?" Grandad would reply: "See now, are you courting, or are you married?" If the answer was "Courting, Mr Challands", Grandad would say: "If

you can afford to go courting, you can afford to pay me threepence!" If, however, the customer replied: "I'm married", Grandad would say: "You'll not be able to afford more than a penny, then", and cheerfully pocketed the odd copper.

"Although he had to be at work by 4.30 or 5 am, according to the season - and four at harvest time - Grandad used to get up early to sweep chimneys. Often he would walk to Bunny, 3/4 mile away, sweep several chimneys at 4d. a time, walk back to Bradmore, and be on his job not a minute late. My Auntie Flo, one of his 15 children, told me an amusing incident about one of his gardening exploits. A man in a nearby village, who had the reputation of being very mean, asked Grandad if he would cut a certain very long hedge for him, and what price would he ask? Grandad agreed to do the job, and named his price. The owner of the hedge barked "Too much! Far too much! Tell you what I'll do, I'll give you sixpence each for your children." "All right," replied Grandad, "That'll do me." The man walked away smirking. But Grandad had the last laugh. The 6d. per child worked out at more than he'd asked for! I'll bet his eyes twinkled that pay day!

"Another incident, told to me by my Auntie Annie, was when Grandad had a wheel-barrow joiner-made at Wysall, 3 miles away. When it was finished he gave young Annie the job of fetching it home. She was only 10 at the time. My mother, then about 4 years old, went with her. She rode most of the way back, while poor Annie did all the pushing, but she said it was worth it all to see the joy in her father's eyes as he examined the well-made barrow.

"As well as being a man of humour, Grandad could be very strict and stern, though always just in his dealings.

"Particularly as a younger man, he was deeply religious. On Sundays he would allow no books or newspapers to be read - only the Bible - and no work done that was not absolutely necessary. Even the vegetables were prepared the day before. And he wouldn't have dreamed of shaving!

Auntie Annie told me how, having managed to get her boots very muddy one Saturday, she was cleaning them one Sunday morning ready for chapel, when Grandad saw her. He was horrified, and very angry, she said. For a punishment he made her go to chapel wearing one clean boot and one muddy one!

"He took every one of his children to chapel on Sunday mornings until they were 4 years old, and could go by themselves, even taking the youngest baby in arms, to leave Grandma free to cook the dinner.

Auntie Annie remembers the "Love Feasts" held at chapel, when the Loving Cup - a 2-handled mug containing Holy wine - was passed among the congregation. She also remembers 7 of the Challands children being christened together one Sunday! Before evening chapel, a 6 o'clock, Grandad used to hold a family hymn-singing in the little kitchen. Every night, when the children had gone to bed, they heard him saying prayers for them. At one time he was a member of the Salvation Army. The meetings were held in his cottage. The baby was dressed up for the occasion in the distinctive blue bonnet.

Grandma made all the clothes for her children - and they always had Sunday ones as well as weekday ones. But Grandad did the buying. He'd go into Nottingham, choose some suitable material, and he always knew a good piece of stuff when he saw it, and purchase a whole bale at a time. Once he saw a bale of pinafore material on show outside a Nottingham warehouse. It was marked very cheaply. Grandad went inside and said he wanted to buy some of it. He was told it was not for sale, but was there to attract custom! Grandad, quite rightly, must have taken a dim view of this for he went straight outside, returned with the bale of material in his arms, and said: "I want this, and I'm having it!" - And he got it!

"Boots he would buy a dozen pairs at a time. He did all his own cobbling. He'd buy hats for the girls in half-dozens, at 6d. each. Auntie Annie remembers being allowed to have the prettiest, one decorated with poppies, daisies and wheat-ears, for helping to carry home the shopping.

"My mother remembers Christmas times particularly. She says that no matter how poor they were, they never missed having a present. These were always something useful, never toys. But every child had a "tuck-bag" as well. This was a bag containing an orange, an apple, butts and sweets. The tuck-bag idea has already been handed down two more generations! I always loved mine, so do my children.

One Christmas Eve the Challands' children were talking in bed. "Wouldn't it be funny if I had cinders in my stocking!" giggled one. "Wouldn't it be funny if I had sticks in mine!" laughed another. The following morning proved that it wasn't quite so funny having cinders and sticks in one's stocking!

Grandad prided himself on never owing a penny, and never having to accept charity. He never spent a penny on himself. But once, Grandma had been ill, and what with doctor's fees and medicine, cash was very scarce. The Challands' plight reached the ears of the organisers of a special charity at Bunny, and a Mrs Walker came along to see Grandad, and give him £5 out of the charity funds. Mother says Grandad took one look at the money and stiffened all over. His hands clenched at his side. Stubbornly he refused it, saying he'd never accepted charity yet, and he wasn't going to now. Mrs Walker was most upset. She knew what the money would mean to them, and explained that people with only one

child had received the charity, but that she couldn't leave the money unless it was signed for. Eventually Grandad did sign, but Mother says it must have been one of the hardest things her father ever had to do in his life.

"What a great pity it is that we sometime don't get to know people until it's too late!

"And Rose Cottage is still there, looking just as it did, a living memory of the man I am proud to have called Grandad."

William Challands, born 1856, Muston, son of John, ag.lab., and Elizabeth. 1861 age 5, scholar, in parents' house at Muston with younger brother George. His family moved to Sproxton by 1869. 1871 age 15, farm servant on Joseph Glenn's farm at Sproxton, top of village. Parents and brother George also in Sproxton, middle of village, with another son John H Challands. 25.11.1875 William Challands servant of Bradmore son of John, labourer, married Mary Jacques, 22, daughter of Samuel, labourer, of Bradmore; she died in 1877. 1880 Apr.qtr. William Challands married Nancy Kettle, Grantham district. 1881 age 25, householder living at Rose Cottage, Far St., agricultural labourer, married to Nancy with daughter Mary (Bradmore 1881/64). W Challands in Methodist Sunday School records 28.7.1889, paid 3d for Sankey. 1891 age 35, farm labourer, married to Ann, children Mary, John, Annie, Maria, Betsey, Isabella and Ellen (Bradmore 1891/54). Challands of Bradmore, no title or name given, recorded receiving a ton of coals Nov.1885 and in 1886 from Bunny & Bradmore Charities. Coals given to William Challands in 1893-4. Electoral roll with house 1886-1941, listed on Main St. from 1920. 1912-1914 two house entries, one without county vote, one without parish vote. 1900 Bunny Estate rental with cottage and garden paying £2 rent pa., and in 1908 rental. 1901 William age 45, waggoner on farm, with wife Ann and children Isabella, Ellen, Kate, Emma, Tom, Fred and Florence in a house on Village Street (Main St.) (Bradmore 43/1901). Worked for Smeeton's at Toft Farm as waggoner for 50 years. Also did jobbing gardening, chimney sweeping, hedge-cutting, hair-cutting, and did his own cobbling. 1911 William age 56, waggoner on farm, with wife Nancy and children Tom and Fred, labourers, Florince (sic) and Ethel scholars, on Village Street, 5-room house (Bradmore 39/1911). Parish councillor 1919-1924. Owned the orchard with Bramley apples trees where 9 and 11 Far St. were built, and had land at Spinney Hill towards Ruddington on the right where he grew corn. Half the crop was ground into flour at Horspools, and half retained for feeding his poultry and the straw was used for bedding pigs which were kept in 2 old cottages at the top of Main St., near where No.37 now stands. Received Bunny Charities dole, grant in lieu of coal and bread 1934, 1939 and 1940. Died 9.2.1941 aged 85, buried north side of Bunny churchyard with Nancy and son Fred.

Mary Challands nee Jacques, born 1854, daughter of Samuel of Bradmore, age 22 married William Challands of Bradmore at Bunny 25.11.1875, buried Bunny 2.11.1877 age 23.

Sarah Elizabeth Challand bapt. Bunny 20.5.1877, daughter of William, labourer, and Mary of Bradmore. 1881 Sarah Elizabeth age 4 in house of grandparents John and Elizabeth at Sproxton. Methodist Sunday School scholar 2nd class 5.7.1885 – June 1886, 1st class July 1886-June 1887, 1st class 2nd part July 1898-22.4.1888, noted left July 1888. 1891 age 14, domestic servant in the household of William Baggaley, Yorke Farm (Bradmore 1891/51). 1897 Oct qtr Sarah Elizabeth Challands married Frank Lester Elliott, Melton Mowbray district. See Elliott.

Nancy (Ann) Challands, nee Kettle, born 1856, Coston Leics., daughter of William, ag.lab., and Sarah. 1861 age 5 in parents' house at Coston. 1871 age 15, general servant for Goadby family, graziers, at Ashby Folville. 1880 Apr.qtr. married William Challands, Grantham district. 1881 age 25, married to William (Bradmore 1881/64). 1891 Ann, age 35, married to William (1891/54). 1901 age 45, married to William (43/1901). 1911 age 56 (married 31 years, 15 children, 1 dead), shown on census as Nancy (Bradmore 39/1911). On electoral roll in Main St, 1920-1929/30. Died 8.6.1929 age 74, buried north side of Bunny churchyard with William and son Fred.

Mary Challands, born 1881, Bradmore, daughter of William and Nancy. 1881 age 3 mths in parents' house (Bradmore 1881/64). Methodist Sunday School scholar 4th class 5.7.1885-Dec.1886, 3rd class Jan.1887-June 1888, 2nd class July 1888 – Dec.1889, 1st class 2nd part Jan.1890-June 1893, 1st class July 1893-8.7.1894. 1891 age 10, scholar in parents' house (Bradmore 1891/54). 1901 age 20 servant in house of Horace Claydon, railway clerk, and family at 8 Hope Drive, Nottingham. 1908 Apr.qtr. Basford district Mary Challands married Thomas Robert Langton of Codnor, son of Samuel, blacksmith in foundry, and Elizabeth. See Langton.

John William Challand, born 16.3.1882 Bradmore, bapt. 18.3.1894 Bradmore Methodist Church, son of William and Nancy. Methodist Sunday School scholar 4th class 25.4.1886-Dec.1888, 3rd class Jan-Dec.1889, 2nd class Jan.1890-June 1891, 1st class 2nd part July 1891 – June 1893, 1st class July 1893-23.5.1897. 1898 noted "Returned thanks". 1891 age 9, scholar in parents' house (Bradmore 1891/54). 1894-6 Methodist choir. Not found in 1901. 1909 April quarter John William Challands married Selina Wright, daughter of William, general labourer, and Ellen, Belper district Derbyshire. 1911 age 29 coal miner with wife Selina age 29 born Ripley (married 2 years with 1 child), Hilda age 1 born

Ripley, at Codnor Gate, Codnor, 5-room house.

Annie Challand, born c1884, Bradmore, daughter of William and Nancy. Methodist Sunday School scholar 5th class 1.1.1888, 4th class 8.1.1888 – June 1890, 3rd class July 1890-June 1893, 2nd class July 1893-Jan.1896, last attendance 9.8.1896. 1891 age 7, scholar in parents' house (Bradmore 1891/54). When she was about ten years old Annie was sent to Wysall to fetch a barrow her father had asked a joiner there to make for him, and took her 4-year old sister with her, who rode most of the way back with Annie pushing the barrow. Annie remembered horrifying her father by cleaning her muddy boots on a Sunday morning, and in punishment she had to go to chapel wearing one clean boot and one muddy one - no work was allowed on Sundays. As a reward for carrying home the shopping Annie was allowed to have a hat decorated with poppies, daisies and wheat ears. 1901 age 18 domestic servant for Henry Holmes, upholsterer on own account, and wife, at 242 Woodborough Rd., Nottingham. 1911 age 26 domestic servant for Edward James Smith lace manufacturer and wife at 21 Loughborough Rd., West Bridgford, 8-room house.

Maria Challand born c1885, Bradmore, daughter of William and Nancy. Methodist Sunday School scholar 4th class 17.3.1889-June 1890, 3rd class July 1898 – Dec.1894. Shown as Marie mid-1891 – Dec.1894. 2nd class Jan.1895 – 30.5.1897. 1891 age 6, scholar in parents' house (Bradmore 1891/54). 1896 joined the Methodist choir. 1901 age 16, servant for Robert Brighton Sutton on own means, and family, at Easthorpe St., Ruddington. 1907 Oct qtr Maria Challands married Charles Archer, Spalding district, son of John, farmer, and Mary of Broadgate, Weston nr Spalding. See Archer.

Betsey Challand, born c1887, Bradmore, daughter of William and Nancy. 1891 age 4, scholar in parents' house (Bradmore 1891/54). Methodist Sunday School Vestry Girls 3.8.1890-June 1893, 3rd class July 1893-Dec.1895, 2nd class Jan.1896-June 1898, 1st class July 1898-5.3.1899, and one week 6.1.1901. 1907 July qtr. Betsey Challands married Herbert Cooper son of Matthew, general labourer, and Sarah Jane of Edwalton. See Cooper.

George Challand born Feb/March 1888, buried Bunny 31.12.1888 age 10 months, probably son of William and Nancy.

Isabella Challand, born 25.5.1889 Bradmore, bapt. Bradmore Methodist Church 18.3.1894, daughter of William and Nancy. 1891 age 1 in parents' house (Bradmore 1891/54). Methodist Sunday School scholar Vestry Girls 18.6.1893 – Dec.1893, 3rd class Jan.1894-Dec.1897, 2nd class Jan-June 1898, 1st class July 1898-12.4.1903. 1901 age 11 in parents' house (Bradmore 43/1901). Isabella was asked to stay on at school by the then headmaster Mr. Watson as a pupil teacher, but was unable to do so because she had to work to help support the family. 1911 Bella Challands age 21 single domestic servant for John Bullock White colliery coal salesman and wife at Highclere, Mapperley Plains, Nottingham, 7-room house. 1919 Apr. qtr., Basford district, Isabella Challands married Charles H Onyon (born Eastwood 1884, in 1911 age 27 cowman on farm at Sacey Fields Farm, Langley, Heanor.) See Onyon, for daughter Dorothy.

Ellen Challands born 7.12.1890 Bradmore, bapt. Bradmore Methodist Church 18.3.1894, daughter of William and Nancy. 1891 age 4 months in parents' house (Bradmore 1891/54). Methodist Sunday School scholar Vestry Girls 9.12.1894-Dec.1895, 3rd class Jan 1896-June 1898. 2nd class July 1898 – June 1901, 1st class July 1901-June 1904. 1901 age 10 in parents' house (Bradmore 43/1901). 1911 age 20, single, domestic servant for Joseph Bostock butter importer and family, with another servant, at Malvern House, Beeston, Nottingham. On electoral roll for Main St. 1930-1961, no local vote up to 1940, specifying Rose Cottage Main St. from 1957. Next door but one to Steeple Cottage (i.e. at No.2 Main St). The cottage had a ladder up to the bedroom. Unmarried. Worked at Bunny Hall for Bertie Edwards. Received Bunny Charities Dole 1940. Died 21.8.1962 at Rose Cottage, Main St., Bradmore, probate 4.9.1962 to solicitor, effects £1095/7/0.

Kate Challands born 18.3.1892 Bradmore, bapt. Bradmore Methodist Church 18.3.1894, daughter of William and Nancy. Methodist Sunday School scholar Vestry Girls 22.3.1896 – Dec.1897, sick 23 May – 20 July 1897, 3rd class Jan 1898 – June 1899, 2nd class July 1899 – June 1902, 1st class July 1902 – Dec. 1905, sick 7 weeks Aug/Sept 1903. 1901 age 9 in parents' house (Bradmore 43/1901). 1911 age 19, single, general servant for Edward Maynard Lucas yeast importer and merchant, and family, at 6 Arthur St., Nottingham, 9-room house.

Emma Challands born 20.8.1893 Bradmore, bapt. Bradmore Methodist Church 18.3.1894, daughter of William and Nancy. Methodist Sunday school scholar Vestry Girls 22.8.1897-Dec 1898, 3rd class Jan.1899 – June 1901, 2nd class July 1901-June 1904, 1st class July 1904-Dec.1905, sick for last 3 weeks of Dec.1905. 1901 age 7 in parents' house (Bradmore 43/1901). 1911 age 17, single, waitress in Refreshment Rooms with another waitress and servant for the same rooms at 54/56 Bridlesmith Gate, 7-room house; census form signed by Henry Lester.

Thomas (Tom) Challands born 27.2.1895 Bradmore, bapt. Bradmore Methodist Church 5.6.1895, son of William and Nancy. Tom and Fred Challands played with J P Smeeton in Gadd's pool,

1890s/1900s (J P Smeeton). Methodist Sunday School scholar Vestry Boys 5.3.1899-June 1901, 3rd class July 1901 – Dec.1903, 2nd class Jan 1904 – Dec.1905. 1904 age 6 in parents' house (Bradmore 43/191). 1911 age 16, labourer on farm, in parents' house (Bradmore 39/1911).

Fred Challands, born c1897, Bradmore, son of William and Nancy. Methodist Sunday School scholar Vestry Boys 24.3.1901 – June 1902, 3rd class July 1902 – Dec.1903, 2nd class Jan.1904 – Dec.1905, no records 1906-June 1912, 1st class July 1912 – June 1913. 1901 age 4 in parents' house (Bradmore 43/1901). 1911 age 14 labourer on farm, in parents' house (Bradmore 39/1911). Died 2.7.1918 and buried Bunny Friday 5.7.1918 aged 21. Commemorated on 1914-18 war memorial in Bradmore Methodist Church. Tombstone on north side of churchyard records Sgt. Fred Challands, dearly loved youngest son of William and Nancy Challands of Bradmore. Deanery Magazine, August 1918: 'To Mr and Mrs Challands and family we offer our deep sympathy in the loss of their son Fred. This is one more sacrifice of life which our young men have made that we might live in safety. Fred Challands, always bright, quick and cheerful, was a Bunny School boy, when old enough went to work with the same spirit which he had manifested in his school days. On 5.12.1914 he enlisted in the Sherwood Foresters, and very quickly attained the rank of Sergeant. He was wounded in action 25.9.1915, and for the second time on 14.2.1916. Only a few days before his death, apparently in good health, he took part in the Regimental Sports but pneumonia overtook him, and before any relations could reach him he passed away in Sheffield Hospital. His remains, escorted by a body of his comrades, were brought home, and on July 5th, with military honours, were laid to rest in our Churchyard.' (i.e. Bunny). Also cutting, unattributed: 'Many of our villages and village congregations will be much poorer after the War because so many of our brave men will return no more. We at Bradmore are mourning the loss of Fred Challands - a loving a dutiful son - one of a large family, a credit to our Sunday School, a regular attendant at our services, respected by all who knew him. He enlisted early in the War, was twice wounded in France, fell a victim to pneumonia and was laid to rest in Bunny Churchyard with military honours.' Newspaper article adds the information that his brother who had been on leave from France only returned the morning the news of Fred's death was received by the family. Fred joined the Colours soon after the outbreak of war when only 17½ years old. After Feb.1916 he returned to a Midland camp with the Notts & Derbs. The coffin was covered with the Union Jack and 6 of his fellow sergeants acted as bearers, the Army chaplain conducting the service assisted by the Vicar of Bunny. Three volleys were fired at the graveside and the buglers sounded the Last Post. Floral tributes included those from Col. Collett and Officers, 51st Notts & Derbs; Officers of C Company, warrant officer and sergeants; teachers and scholars of Bunny Schools. An artificial wreath and globe was sent by the warrant officers and sergeants

Florence Challands, born 1900 Bradmore, daughter of William and Nancy. 1901 age 8 mths in parents' house (Bradmore 43/1901). Methodist Sunday School scholar Vestry Girls 31.7.1904 – Dec.1904, 3rd class Jan-Dec.1905, no records 1906 – June 1912, 1st class July 1912 – 23.8.1914. 1911 Florince (sic) age 10, at school, in parents' house (Bradmore 39/1911). On photographs received via Dorothy Onyon. Died Oct.1898 age 89, Rushcliffe district.

Ethel Challands, born 1902 Bradmore, the youngest child of William and Nancy. Methodist Sunday School scholar Vestry Girls, 3-30 Dec.1905, no records 1906 – June 1912, 1st class July 1912 – 23.7.1916. 1911 age 9, scholar, in parents' house (Bradmore 39/1911). Apr qtr 1921, Nottingham district, Ethel married Albert Buttery of Ruddington.

CHAMBERLAIN

Nicholas Chamberlain 1641 took the Protestation Oath, supporting the true Protestant Religion. Possibly the Nicholas who married Elizabeth Stevenson at Bunny & Bradmore 9.2.1623. Note ref to baptism of Alice 6.2.1624 shows father as Nicholas. His house in Bradmore was the venue for christening of William son of Gervase and Mary Nixon, 8.6.1652.

Alice Chamberlain married William Hornbuckle of Bunny at Bunny 14.4.1657. Not necessarily Alice the daughter of Nicholas, may be Alice daughter of John also bapt. 1624. See also William Hornbuckle, brother of Mary Cartwright.

Mary Chamberlain daughter of Ann? of Bradmore bapt. Bunny 5.2.1691.

Joseph Chamberlain made a will 27.1.1711, proved 14.3.1711, left to his daughter Elizabeth Chamberline £15 within 2 years of his death, and £5 in household goods. Appointed Christopher Barson and John Nixon trustees. Residue of estate to Susanna, his wife and executrix. Inventory taken 1.2.1711 comprising: purse and apparell £14/2/-; a bedstead and some old things in the chamber 10/-; bed in the parlor £2/15/-; 2 chests and some old boxes and things in the parlour £1; a churn and 2 barrells and some odd things in the milk house 7/-; the biggest pewter dishes and the little flaggon 9/-; the cupboard and the rest of the pewter upon it 15/-; the great pann £1/5/-; the rest of the brass £1/18/-; the table and form and rest of the odd things in the house 16/-; wheat and barley £2/18/-; 3 cows and a

calf £8; 10 sheep £2; total £36/15/-, by John Nixon and Christopher Barson. Possibly the same Joseph who married Elizabeth Blood of Bradmore at Bunny 11.2.1692, and became widower Oct.1693 with one surviving child, Elizabeth. Susanna may therefore be second wife. A Joseph Chamberlain son of Thomas and Ann bapt. at Bunny 13.6.1671, may possibly be this Joseph but no direct evidence.

Elizabeth Chamberlain wife of Joseph buried Bunny 22.10.1693. Possibly Elizabeth Blood who married Joseph Chamberlain, both of Bradmore, at Bunny 11.2.1692.

John Chamberlain son of Joseph and Elizabeth Chamberlain of Bradmore buried Bunny 14.10.1693.

Elizabeth Chamberlain bapt. Bunny 28.1.1695, daughter of Joseph and Elizabeth of Bradmore, received a bequest in her father's will 1711. However this is two years after the assumed date of her mother's death, so was either a late baptism or there are two Josephs married to Elizabeths at this time, though no other evidence of a second couple.

Susanna Chamberlain married to Joseph, probably Susannah Bennett of Plumtree who married Joseph Chamberlain 16.1.1700. Assumed second wife, after first wife Elizabeth died 1693. Susanna married William Keightly of Bunny at Bunny 4.11.1711 – may be the widow of Joseph Chamberlain, who died in February 1711.

Mary Chamberlain married Stephen Spencer of Gotham at Gotham 27.11.1786.

Mary Chamberlain born c1787, buried Bunny 23.4.1838 age 55.

Bengemen Chambland in Constables Accounts 1.4.1797, received 10/6 when ill.

William Chamberlain received payment from Constable 1794 for catching sparrows.

Benjamin Chamberlain born c1805, Gotham. Benjamin Chamberlain married Ann Hadden, both of Bradmore, 25.11.1828. Benjamin's wife is named mostly as Mary, but appears as Ann in 1881 census, assumed to be the same person. 1841 age 36, agricultural labourer, householder, married to Mary with children William, James, John and Catherine, lived on Far St. (Bradmore 1841/64). 1851 age 46, farm labourer, married to Mary, with children Catherine, Sarah, Benjamin and Elizabeth (Bradmore 1851/22). 1861 age 56, agricultural labourer, married to Ann, daughters Elizabeth and Mary (Bradmore 1861/42). Benjamin Chamberlain on Bunny Estate rental 1867 renting house and garden at £2/10/- pa. Buried Bunny 13.2.1870, age 66.

Mary/Ann Chamberlain born c1809, Woodhouse Eaves, nee Hadden. Benjamin Chamberlain married Ann Hadden, both of Bradmore, 25.11.1828. Benjamin's wife is named mostly as Mary in early baptisms (to 1836) and censuses (to 1851), but appears as Ann in baptisms after 1836 and censuses from 1861, assumed to be the same person due to overlap of dates. 1841 age 70 (should be 30), married to Benjamin (Bradmore 1841/64). 1851 age 41, married to Benjamin (Bradmore 1851/22). 1861 Ann, age 52, married to Benjamin (Bradmore 1861/42). 1871 age 62, widow, schoolmistress, householder, still in the same cottage on Far St., with her daughter Mary (Bradmore 1871/28). 1879 Widow Chamberlain granted 1/- p.wk for 20 weeks by Bunny & Bradmore charities, and 1/- p.wk. from 16.9.1880-31.3.1881. 1881 age 72, widow, householder, with her daughter Elizabeth (1881/25). 1881-87 received 1/- p.wk. from Bunny & Bradmore Charities and a ton of coal in 1887. Buried Bunny 15.3.1888 age 78.

William Chamberlain born c1830 son of Benjamin and Mary. 1841 age 11 in parents' house (Bradmore 1841/64).

Ann Chamberlain born c1832 daughter of Benjamin and Mary. 1841 age 9 in parents' house (Bradmore 1841/64).

James Chamberlain born c1836 son of Benjamin and Mary. 1841 age 5 in parents' house (Bradmore 1841/64). 1851 age 16 servant on widow Elizabeth Burton's farm, Gotham.

John Chamberlain born 12.4.1838, bapt. Bunny 19.10.1839 son of Benjamin, labourer, and Ann of Bradmore. 1841 age 3 in parents' house (Bradmore 1841/64). 1851 age 15 farm servant for William Pyatt, farmer, Wilford.

Catherine Chamberlain bapt. Bunny 24.7.1840, daughter of Benjamin, labourer, and Ann of Bradmore. 1841 age 10 months (Bradmore 1841/64). 1851 age 10, scholar in parents' house (Bradmore 1851/22). 1861 age 21, dairymaid at Robert Burrows' farm of 450 acres, farmhouse at 23 East Thorpe Ruddington. Catherine daughter of Benjamin, labourer married John Priestley labourer of Barton, son of Thomas, ag.lab, and Mary of Barton, at Bunny 30.12.1861. See Priestley.

Sarah Chamberlain bapt. Bunny 10.5.1843, daughter of Benjamin, labourer, and Ann of Bradmore. 1851 age 7, scholar in parents' house (Bradmore 1851/22). Sarah, still a minor, daughter of Benjamin, labourer, married Charles Key, also a minor, labourer of Bradmore, at Bunny 15.5.1862. Later married George Cottterill. See Key and Cotterill.

Benjamin Chamberlain bapt. Bunny 7.10.1845, son of Benjamin, labourer and Ann of Bradmore. 1851 age 5, scholar in parents' house (Bradmore 1851/22). 1861 Benjamin "Chambers" age 15 born Bradmore, servant with Richard Taylor, confectioner, and family at 4 Listergate, Nottingham. 1868 Jan.qtr. Basford district, Benjamin Chamberlain married Eliza Culley, daughter of John, lace agent,

and Mary Ann of Harby Rd., Stathern. 1871 Benjamin age 25, confectioner, with wife Eliza age 24 born Stathern and children Arthur 2, Annie Elizabeth 1 and wife's sister Emma Culley single 25 milliner born Stathern, and servant at 8 Houndsgate, Nottingham. 1881 Benjamin age 35, master confectioner, with wife Eliza age 34 born Stathern and children Arthur 12, Annie E 11, Florence 9, John B 7 scholars, Gertrude 4 and Ethel B 6 mths, all born Nottingham, and servant at 8 Houndsgate, Nottingham. 1891 Benjamin age 45 confectioner, married but wife not present (whereabouts not found), with children Arthur 22 clerk, Annie E 21, Florence 19 and John B 17 assistant confectioners, and Archie B 8 and Edith M 6 scholars, all born Nottingham, at 183 Mansfield Rd., Nottingham. Benjamin Chamberlain born 1846 died 1899, Basford district.

Edward Chamberlain bapt. Bunny 14.3.1848, son of Benjamin, labourer, and Ann of Bradmore buried Bunny 3.3.1848, infant.

Elizabeth Chamberlain, bapt. Bunny 18.8.1849, daughter of Benjamin labourer and Ann of Bradmore. 1851 age 1 in parents' house (Bradmore 1851/22). 1861 age 11, scholar in parents' house (Bradmore 1861/42). 1871 age 22 born Bradmore gen.svt. for George H Goater, printer's clerk at 25 Park Row, Nottingham. 1881 age 30, single in house of widowed mother Mary (Bradmore 1881/25). Married at Bunny 28.11.1882, daughter of Benjamin, labourer, to George Hornbuckle labourer of Bradmore, son of John, carrier. Some of their children are given Chamberlain as their middle name. See Hornbuckle.

Emma Chamberlain bapt. Bunny 26.1.1853, daughter of Benjamin, labourer, and Ann of Bradmore, buried 1.9.1853 age 7 months.

Mary Chamberlain bapt. Bunny 24.1.1855, daughter of Benjamin, labourer, and Ann of Bradmore. 1861 age 6, scholar in parents' house (Bradmore 1861/42). 1871 age 16, single, domestic servant in mother Mary's house (Bradmore 1871/28). Married at Bunny 7.11.1876 age 22, daughter of Benjamin labourer, to James Whittaker, age 22, labourer of New Radford, son of John, labourer. See Whittaker.

George Chamberlain, bapt 22.12.1782, Gotham, son of Benjamin and Mary. Framework knitter, married Mary Hallam of Bradmore, recorded as 13.9.1803 in the register; banns recorded as read 4th, 11th and 18th October 1804 but these dates are Sundays in Sept.1803, and marriage should perhaps read 18th? Possibly the Chamberlain in the Constable's accounts receiving 10/6 for a doctor's bill for his wife, Feb.1812, and a further £2 later in the month for her. July 1812 he had 4/- from the Constable, and in September 1½ stone of flour, 6/3. Feb.1813 George Chamberlain named as having 2 weeks pay from the Constable, 4/-, possibly for work at the house row, and in March the Constable gave him 6/-. April 1813 he had a pair of shoes, 10/6, and a strike of barley, 8/7½d, and 1/6 in cash. In May he was receiving 2/- p.wk. 30.8.1813 the Constable paid George Chamberlain 13/- when his wife was ill, and paid for coals and expenses £2/6/-. Oct.1813 paid for a pair of stockings for Chamberlain's boy, 1/8. 1841 George Chamberlain age 55 in house of son George and wife Eliza, at East Leake. 1851 George age 70, widower, framework knitter, in son George's house at Back Lane, East Leake.

Mary Chamberlain nee Hallam of Bradmore, married George at Bunny 13.9.1803 per register - see note above on banns. 1812 Mary had money from the Constable to pay doctor's bills, and again Aug.1813 when she was ill. Dec.1813 the Constable paid Mary for washing for Elliot's boy at 6d p.wk., total 8/-. Probably died before 1841.

John Chamberlain bapt. Bunny 16.4.1809, son of George and Mary of Bradmore. Buried 20.3.1829 age 20.

William Chamberlain bapt. Bunny 14.9.1811, son of George and Mary of Bradmore, presumably died before Oct.1812.

William Chamberlain bapt. Bunny 1.10.1812, son of George and Mary of Bradmore. Not found 1841. 1851 age 39, ag.lab. married to Rebecca 38 born in Cotgrave, with children Eliza 7, Elizabeth 3, William 1, all born in Ruddington, and Joseph Stevison, 37, lodger, widower, born Bradmore (born 1813, son of William framework knitter and Elizabeth), and his daughter Charlotte, 12, born Clifton, in Ruddington. 1861 William Chamberlain age 49 ag.lab. born Bradmore with wife Rebecca age 48 seamer b Ruddington and son John 12 ag.boy born Ruddington, at 8 East Thorpe, Ruddington. 1871 William age 59, agricultural labourer, and Rebecca age 58 living with "son" John Chamberlain 57, widower, farm labourer (this would appear to be the John Stevison age 37 in 1851), on Easthorpe St. Ruddington. 1881 William age 69 ag.lab. with wife Rebecca 68 at Wilford Rd., Ruddington.

George Chamberlain bapt. Bunny 29.12.1814, son of George and Mary of Bradmore, buried Bunny 10.5.1815 age 3 (months).

George Chamberlain bapt. Bunny 1.7.1816, son of George, framework knitter, and Mary of Bradmore. Probably George, framework knitter, of full age, son of George framework knitter, who married Eliza Smalley of Bradmore at Bunny 13.5.1839. 1841 George Chamberlain age 20 framework knitter with wife Eliza age 20 and father George age 55, at East Leake. 1851 George Chamberlain age 35 born Bradmore, framework knitter, with wife Eliza age 32 born East Leake 1819

with children George 9, Mary 6, Sunday School scholars, Sarah 3, Rebecca 2 mths all born East Leake, with George's father George in the household, at East Leake.

Elizabeth Chamberlain bapt. Bunny 29.11.1818, daughter of George, framework knitter, and Mary of Bradmore.

Elijah Chamberlain born c1820, buried Bunny 9.3.1825 age 4, probably son of George and Mary.

Elizabeth Chamberlain bapt. Bunny 15.5.1821, daughter of George, framework knitter, and Mary of Bradmore, possibly the Elizabeth buried at Bunny 28.5.1823, no age given.

Mary Chamberlain bapt. Bunny 30.12.1824, daughter of George, framework knitter, and Mary of Bradmore, buried Bunny 12.12.1834 age 10.

Chamberlain in the Constable's Accounts, Christian name never mentioned. In Oct.1804 the Constable paid Mr Hopkinson for advice about him, and 15.10.1804 paid 2/- for his examination and 1/- for his expenses. Jan.1805 Elisabeth Bosworth had 11 weeks rent for him, at 1/- p.wk., and again in Oct.1805. Jan.1806 the Constable paid Chamberlain 7/- for carriage of his goods to Kegworth, but Nov.1806 he paid rent for him again. March 1807 paid Mr Nixon for carriage of Chamberlain and Goods, and 1807 paid his rent, but with a reference to him leaving in 1807-8.

Thomas Chamberlain born c.1811. 1841 age 30, servant, in the household of John Nixon, Rufford Lodge (1841/70).

Sidney Chamberlain born c1821. 1841 age 20, servant in the household of Richard and Mary Walker, Rancliffe Farm (1841/80).

John Chamberlain of Bradmore buried Bunny 28.5.1808.

John Chamberlain born c1839 at Ruddington, framework knitter of Bradmore. 28.8.1859 at Bunny married Mary Ann Jackson of Bradmore. 1861 age 23, framework knitter, married to Mary Ann with daughter Catherine at 6 Kirk Lane Ruddington. 1871 age 32, framework knitter, married to Mary Ann age 31, with children Catherine 14, seamer stockings born Bradmore, Thomas 9 cotton winder, Elizabeth E 6 scholar, Sarah Ann 4 scholar, Emma Ann 1 all born Ruddington, living on Kirk Lane Ruddington. 1881 John age 42, framework knitter, with wife Mary Ann age 40, children Eliza Ann 16 seamstress machinist, Sarah Ann 14 hosiery maker, Emma Ann 11, Martha 7, John 5 scholars and Benjamin 4 mths all born Ruddington, at Church St., Ruddington. Died before 1891.

Mary Ann Chamberlain born 1840 Bradmore, natural daughter of Sarah Jackson, married John at Bunny 28.8.1859. 1861 age 20, seamer, married to John. 1871 age 31 married to John. 1881 Mary Ann age 40 married to John. 1891 Mary A, widow age 51, with children Martha 17 machinist, John 15 scholar, Benjamin 10 scholar born Ruddington, at 5 Wilsons Yard, Nottingham. 1901 Mary Ann Chamberlain widow age 63 hosiery seamer born Bradmore with married daughter Eliza Smedley 36 hosiery maker born Ruddington (married 1885 Jan qtr to William Smedley born 1864 Southwell), son Benjamin Chamberlain 20 joiner born 1881 Ruddington, grand-daughters Eliza Chamberlain 19 born Ruddington 1882, hosiery maker, Harriet Chamberlain 16 born Nottingham 1885, hosiery turner-off, and Margaret Parker 10 born Nottingham 1891, at 16 Alban St., Nottingham. 1911 Mary Ann age 72 widow, seamstress hosiery, with daughters Eliza Smedley 46 widow, machinist, and Sarah Parker 44 widow, machinist, both born Ruddington, and grand-daughter Margaret Elizabeth Parker 20, machinist, born Nottingham, at 169 Wollaton St., Nottingham, 4-room house.

Catherine Chamberlain born 9.10.1859, bapt. 31.10.1859, daughter of John, framework knitter, and Mary Ann of Bradmore. 1861 age 1 in parents' house (Rudd 1861/5). 1871 age 14, seamer of stockings, in her parents' house. Possibly the Catherine who married William Foster of Bradmore c1880.

Child of George Chamberlain referred to in note inside back cover of Highways Accounts, dated 1857. 'A child of George Chamberlain was sent to Loughborough union by Leake Parish, and they Rote from the Union to Bradmore parish to see whether they would acknowledge it (1st letter 1 May) and they would not, without they would produce a certificate and they could not (2nd letter in September).'

Mary/Sarah Chappell born 1796/8 Bradmore, maiden name(s) not known, married to Joseph Chappell. 1841 Joseph Chappell age 40 ag.lab. with wife Sarah age 35 in the house of Thomas Chappell age 75 farmer and his wife Annie 70 at Beesthorpe, Caunton. 1851 Joseph age 53 farmer of 29 acres with 1 labourer, born Caunton, with wife Sarah 55 born Bradmore, at Grassthorpe, Notts. 1861 Joseph Chappell age 61 farmer of 10 acres born Caunton, with wife Mary 63 born Bradmore, at Grassthorpe, Notts. 1871 age 75 married to Joseph 72 farmer of 30 acres, with wife Mary 75 born Bradmore and niece Jane Mackland 26 born Parsonstower, Ireland, at Grassthorpe. Mary Chappell

born 1796 died Jan.qtr. 1872, Southwell district. Joseph Chappell born 1800 died 1879, Southwell district.

Robert Cheetham, butcher, in Whites Directory 1832, married to Mary. 1841 Robert age 35, night police, with wife Mary 34 and children William 10, Isabella 6, John 4 at East St., St. Mary's, Nottingham. 1851 Robert age 44 police constable born Nottingham with wife Mary 40 born Gotham and children William 20 tailor born Nottingham, Isabella 15 dressmaker, John 14 and Louisa Jane 10 scholars, all born Bradmore, and Mary Ann 6 scholar born Askham Notts at Cheapside, Radford, Worksop. 1861 Robert age 58 butcher, with wife Mary 54 and children John, Louisa J, Mary A 17 milliner and dressmaker born Roakley, married daughter Isabella S Wilson, and grand-daughter Jane R P Wilson.

Isabella Cheetham bapt. Bunny 19.12.1834, daughter of Robert, butcher and Mary of Bradmore. 1841 age 6 in parents' house. 1851 age 15 dressmaker in parents' house. 1861 married, surname Wilson, age 25, milliner and dressmaker, with her daughter Jane R P Wilson age 3 born Dudley, in her parents' house.

Gideon Christian born c1822, Melton Leics. 1841 Gideon Christian age 19, servant, at Bunny Hall stables. 19.4.1847, then of Bunny, married Mary Smith of Bradmore at Bunny. 1848 signed Sunday School accounts. 1851 age 29, gardener, married to Mary, in house of in-laws John and Ann Smith, who lived on Farmer St. in 1841 and at Southwell Cottages, Main St. in 1861 but the date of their move is not known (Bradmore 1851/65). Gideon was a groom, and a notable character with the Belvoir Hunt (Source: Rudd Local Hist Soc.). 1861 Gideon age 39, gardener, with wife Mary age 36 born Bradmore, and children Maria 9, Horatio 7, Elizabeth 4, born Bradmore, and Sarah A 2 born Cotgrave, all scholars, at Cotgrave. 1871 Gideon age 49, groom and gardener, married to Mary, with daughter Mary Catherine 10, scholar, born 1861 Cotgrave, son John 3, scholar, born Ruddington, and John Smith, father-in-law, 71, widower, at The Green, Ruddington. 1881 Gideon age 59 gardener with wife Mary age 56, children John 13 stocking FWK born Ruddington, Elizabeth 20 dressmaker born Bradmore, married daughter Maria 29 dressmaker born Bradmore and her husband Robert Garrett 39 blacksmith born Wells, Norfolk, at The Green, Ruddington. In the late 1800s four of his family were married at St Peter's, Ruddington. Not found 1891. 1901 Gideon, widower age 79, in house of son in law Robert Garrett 60 blacksmith with wife Maria 49 dressmaker at home, and their children, at 67 Caroline St., Nottingham. 1908 July qtr. Gideon Christian died, Nottingham.

Mary Christian born 1827, Bradmore, daughter of John and Ann Smith. Married Gideon Christian of Bunny 19.4.1847 at Bunny. 1851 age 24, married to Gideon, in parents' household (Bradmore 1851/65). 1861 age 36 married to Gideon at Cotgrave. 1871 age 45, married to Gideon, at The Green, Ruddington. 1881 Mary age 56 married to Gideon at The Green, Ruddington. 1887 Apr.qtr. Mary Christian died, Nottingham.

Martha Christian bapt. Bunny 29.6.1847, daughter of Gideon, under-gardener, and Mary of Bradmore. 1851 age 4, scholar, in grandparents John and Ann Smith's house (Bradmore 1851/65).

Frederick Christian bapt. Bunny 14.4.1849, son of Gideon, under-gardener, and Mary of Bradmore. 1851 age 2, in grandparents John and Ann Smith's house (Bradmore 1851/65). 1861 age 11, worsted winder, in his grandparents' house, at Southwell Cottages, Main St. (Bradmore 1861/63). 1871 age 21, railway porter, lodger with Thomas Morgan, engine driver Midland Railway and his wife at Radlett, Aldenham, Herts. 1873 Jan qtr Frederick Christian married Miriam Elizabeth L Colegate, daughter of Richard, journeyman bricklayer, and Elizabeth of Bexley Heath, Kent, at St.Pancras, London. 1881 Frederick age 31 railway station master with wife Miriam age 26 born Bexley Heath and children Leonard 7 born Bexley Heath and Minnie 5 born Harlington Beds, scholars, at the Railway Station, Harlington Beds. 1891 Frederick age 42 station master for Midland Railway with wife Miriam age 37 and children Leonard 17, Minnie 15 at Toddington Road, Harlington. 1901 Frederick age 52, station master, railway, with wife Miriam age 47 and children Leonard age 27, Minnie age 25, at High St, Shefford Beds. 1911 Frederick age 61, superannuated railway official, married to Miriam 56 (married 38 years with 3 children, 2 dead), with daughter Minnie 35 single, at Middle Lambrook, South Petherton, Somerset, 8-room house. Frederick Christian died 1933, Newport

Pagnall, Bucks. Miriam Christian died 1949, North Bucks.

Maria Christian born 1851 Bradmore, bapt. Bunny 22.7.1851, daughter of Gideon, under-gardener, and Mary of Bradmore. 1861 Maria age 9 in parents' house at Cotgrave. Not found in 1871 (NOT Mary Catherine age 10 in parents' house 1871). 1880 Dec.qtr. Basford district, Maria Christian married Robert Garret son of William, blacksmith, and Martha of Wells, Norfolk. See Garrett.

Horatio Christian born 1854 Bradmore, bapt. Bunny 15.4.1854, son of Gideon, gardener, and Mary of Bradmore. 1861 Horatio age 7 in parents' house. 1871 age 17, groom for Edward Barber, farmer, at Brodsworth cum Pigburn, nr Doncaster, Yorkshire. 1875 Apr.qtr. Basford Horatio Christian married either Elizabeth Hardy or Elizabeth Henson? 1881 Horatio age 26 hosiery hand with wife Elizabeth age 28 born Ruddington and children Walter H 5 scholar and Frederick H 1 both born Ruddington, plus sister Mary Christian 20 single, machinist born Cotgrave, at 98 Waterway St Nottingham. 1891 age 36, framework knitter, with wife Elizabeth age 38 and children Walter H 15 clicker apprentice, Frederick H 11 scholar, John H S 4 all born Ruddington, at 69 Vulcan Rad, Leicester. 1901 age 46 hosiery framework knitter with wife Elizabeth age 48 and children Walter H 25, Frederick H 21 both hosiery warehousemen born Ruddington and John H S 14 born Nottingham, at 69 Vulcan Rd Leicester. 1911 age 56, hosiery machinist with wife Elizabeth age 58 (married 35 years with 3 children, 1 dead - Walter Horatio Christian died Jan qtr 1903, Salford Lancs.) with son John Harold Smith Christian 24 sorting clerk and telegraphist for PO, born Nottingham, at 94 Mere Road Leicester 6-room house. 1915 Jan.qtr. Elizabeth Christian died, Leicester. 1919 Dec.qtr. Leicester, Horatio Christian married ? Thompson. 1921 Sep qtr Leicester Horatio Christian died.

Elizabeth Christian born 1857 Bradmore, bapt. Bunny 4.2.1857, daughter of Gideon, gardener, and Mary of Bradmore. 1861 Elizabeth age 4 in parents' house. 1871 age 15, general domestic servant for Thomas Redfern, farmer, and family at Wysall. 1881 Elizabeth age 20 dressmaker in parents' house. Jul.qtr. 1886 Basford, Elizabeth Christian married Joseph Cusworth, railway platelayer, son of John, mason's labourer and Hannah of Wath upon Dearne, Yorkshire. Apr.qtr.1895 Elizabeth Cusworth widow married William Mugliston, widower of Melbourne Derbyshire. See Cusworth, Mugliston.

Sarah Ann Christian born c1859, Cotgrave, daughter of Gideon and Mary. 1861 age 2 in parents' house.

Mary Catherine Christian born c1861, Cotgrave, daughter of Gideon and Mary. 1871 age 10 in parents' house. 1881 age 20, single, machinist in brother Horatio's house.

George Henry Clark, born c1868, Corby Lincs, son of Thomas, ag.lab. and Mary of Corby. 1881 as Clark, age 14 ag.lab in parents' house, Corby. 1889 Apr.qtr. Basford district, George Henry Clarke married Sarah Harrison daughter of Thomas framework knitter and Ann of Ruddington. 1891 age 23, householder, agricultural labourer, married to Sarah, with son George, living on Farmer St., 4-room house, possibly near the Orchard House corner (Bradmore 1891/37). Electoral roll, house with no county vote, 1891-1893, with full vote 1894-5. 1901 George Henry Clarke age 33 brewery waggoner with wife Sarah age 32 and children George H 11, Annie M 7, Thomas E 2 born Holme Lane, at Alma Hill, Kimberley Notts. 1911 George Henry Clarke age 43 ag.lab. horseman with wife Sarah age 42 born Ruddington dressmaker on own account at home, with children Annie Mary 17, worker at home, and Thomas Evelyn Clarke 12 scholar born Holme Lane, Notts., at Engine Lane, Lower Beauvale, Newelthorpe (Greasley district) Notts.

Sarah Clark, born c1869, Ruddington. 1891 age 22, married to George Henry (Bradmore 1891/37). 1901 age 32 married to George Henry, at Kimberley. 1911 age 42 (married 21 years with 4 children, 1 dead), married to George Henry, at Lower Beauvale.

George H Clark, born c1890, Ruddington, son of George Henry and Sarah. 1891 age 1 in parents' house (Bradmore 1891/37). 1901 age 11 in parents' house. 1911 George Henry Clarke age 21 coal cutter in mine married to Gertrude nee Daykin age 22 (married 4 years, 2 children, both alive – plus youngest not counted!) born Cotmanhay, Derbys., with children Doris Clarke-Daykin 4 born Awsworth, Stanley Clarke 2 and Elsie May 3 mths born Kimberley, with sister-in-law Catherine Daykin 45 single, factory-hand lace, born Cotmanhay, at Lynn Croft, Eastwood Notts, 4-room house.

Annie Mary Clark(e) born 1894 Bradmore, daughter of George Henry and Sarah. 1901 age 7 in parents' house. 1911 age 17, worker at home, in parents' house.

Thomas Evelyn Clark(e) born 1899 Holme Lane, Notts, son of George Henry and Sarah. 1901 age 2 in parents' house. 1911 age 12 scholar in parents' house.

CLAXTON

John A Claxton, born c1872, Saltby Leicestershire, son of John, cottager of 4 acres, and Ann of Saltby. 1881 age 9 scholar in parents' house in mid-village, next to Nags Head Inn. 1891 age 19, single, farm

servant in the household of George Grundy, Manor Farm (1891/33). 1894 Apr.qtr. Nottingham John Arthur Claxton married Elizabeth Ann Rayson daughter of John, ag.lab and Elizabeth of Skillington Lincs. 1901 John Arthur Claxton age 28 greengrocer and wet fish (seller) on own account at home with wife Elizabeth Ann age 27 with children John Bernard 4 and Alec 1 scholars born 2 Norman Place Nottingham, at 156 Gordon Rd., Nottingham NE. 1911 John Arthur Claxton age 39 greengrocer on own account at home with wife Elizabeth Ann age 37 married 16 years with 3 children, John B 14, Alec 11 and Madeleine 8 scholars, Madeline born at 156 Gordon Rd., plus nephew Arthur Claxton 19 born Saltby assisting in business, at 156 Gordon Rd Nottingham 5-room house.

CLAYTON

Mary Clayton married Henry Dean of Plumtree at Bunny 16.11.1740.

CLEMENTS

Ann Clements born c 1774, buried Bunny 7.12.1834 age 60.

Elizabeth Clements born 1799/1800, buried Bunny 26.2.1831 age 31.

Edward Clemens married Sarah Igleston, both of Bradmore, at Bunny 22.8.1802. Dec.1800 the Constable paid Edward Clemmens for catching sparrows. Jan.1803 the Constable paid 5/- for fetching Ed Clemens' bricks. 18.6.1804 Edward Clements sworn in as Pinder. Presumably the same who signs the Constable's Accounts 1809 as pinder, with a X. 1812 rented grazing on Plumtree Lane for £1. Subsequent references to the Pinder are un-named, e.g. 10.4.1824 1/- for swearing in the Pinder - possibly indicating a change of office-holder.

Thomas Clements born 1803 Bradmore son of Edward and Sarah. Not found until 1871 age 68 Baptist minister without charge with wife Emily age 65 born Bedford St Johns at Dunstable St, Ampthill. 1881 Thomas age 78 retired Baptist minister born Bradmore with wife Emily age 72 born Bedford St Johns at Dunstable Rd., Ampthill. Emily died 1888, buried 11.4.1888 at Ampthill.

Jonathan Clements son of Edward and Sarah of Bradmore, bapt. Bunny 20.5.1804. Married (1) Elizabeth, (2) Ann, before 1836, and (3) Mary before 1881. 1841 age 35, agricultural labourer, householder, married to Ann with children Jane, Edward, John and William, also Michael Whitehead described as son in law. Lived in the row of cottages on Loughborough Rd. north of the Forge (Bradmore 1841/4). 1851 age 47, farm labourer, married to Ann, children Edward, John, William, and son in law Michael Whitehead (Bradmore 1851/24). 1861 Jonathan Clements age 56 ag.lab with wife Ann age 59 domestic work, son in law Michael Whitehead age 31 framework knitter born Kegworth Leics, and daughter (of Jonathan) Mary Whitehead married to Michael age 28 seamstress born Keyworth Notts, also Jonathan's children John 23 framework knitter and William 21 framework knitter both born Bradmore, living at Sideley, Kegworth Leics. 1881 Jonathan Clements age 76 cowkeeper born Bradmore with wife Mary age 50 born Kegworth and father in law John Tugby, widower 86 retired shoemaker (lodger) born Loughborough. 1891 Jonathan Clements age 86 of independent means born Bradmore with wife Mary age 60 born Kegworth Leics at Sidelee, Diseworth, Kegworth. 1895 Jonathan Clements born 1804 died 1891, Shardlow district.

Elizabeth Clements first wife of Jonathan, with children born in the 1820s and 1830, but died before 1836 by which time Jonathan had married Ann.

Jane Clements born c1826, daughter of Jonathan and Elizabeth. 1841 age 15 in father's house (Bradmore 1841/4). 12.7.1847 married John Mills of Wymeswold. See Mills.

Ann Clements bapt. Bunny 12.3.1829, daughter of Jonathan, labourer, and Elizabeth of Bradmore. Probably died before 1836.

Edwin Joseph Clements bapt. Bunny 17.11.1830, son of Jonathan, labourer, and Elizabeth of Bradmore - possibly the same person as Edward, see below.

Edward Clements born c1830, Bradmore, son of Jonathan. 1841 age 10 in father's house (Bradmore 1841/4). 1851 age 21, single, framework knitter, in father's house (Bradmore 1851/24). 1861 Edward Clements age 30 born Bradmore with wife Elizabeth age 28 born Ashby de la Zouche and children Ann 2, Jane 3 mths both born Worthington, at Worthington by Breedon, Leics.

Ann Clements born c1803, Kegworth. Possibly formerly Whitehead. married Jonathan before 1836, and seems to have brought with her into the family a son Michael Whitehead born c1830/1. 1841 age 35, married to Jonathan (Bradmore 1841/4). 1851 age 48, married to Jonathan (1851/24). 1861 age 59 married to Jonathan.

Ann Clements bapt. 7.8.1836, daughter of Jonathan, labourer, and Ann of Bradmore, buried Bunny 23.7.1839 age 3.

John Clements bapt. Bunny 7.1.1838, son of Jonathan, labourer, and Ann of Bradmore. 1841 age 5 in parents' house (Bradmore 1841/4). 1851 age 13, farm labourer, in parents' house (Bradmore 1851/24). 1861 age 23 framework knitter in parents' house at Kegworth.

William Clements born c1840, Bradmore, son of Jonathan and Ann. 1841 age 1 in parents' house (Bradmore 1841/4). 1851 age 10, scholar in parents' house (Bradmore 1851/24). 1861 age 21 framework knitter in parents' house at Kegworth.

Mary Clements born 1831 Kegworth Leics, married to Jonathan by 1881 as his third wife. 1881 age 50 married to Jonathan. 1891 age 60 married to Jonathan.

Edward Clements born Bradmore c1805, bapt. Bunny 26.10.1806, son of Edward and Sarah of Bradmore. 1851 Edward Clements age 46 cowkeeper born Bradmore with wife Ann age 41 born Barton, Notts, with children John 18 born Wilford, no occupation recorded, and Joseph 12, Ann 10, Elizabeth 8, William 6, Arthur age 4 scholars and Jane 2 mths, all born Wilford, at Wilford. 1861 Edward Clements age 56 cottager and milk seller born Bradmore with wife Ann age 57, children Joseph 23 musician, Arthur 12, Thomas 5 scholars, all born Wilford at Wilford (listed next to Ferry Boat inn). Edward Clements born c1808 died July 1868, Basford district.

Elizabeth Clements bapt. Bunny 25.8.1808, daughter of Edward and Sarah of Bradmore. The Constable paid Elizabeth £1/5/- lying in for one month, Sept.1827, and another 10/- in Feb.1828.

John Clements bapt. Bunny 27.10.1827, illegitimate son of Elizabeth of Bradmore.

William Clements bapt. Bunny 14.8.1811, son of Edward and Sarah. 1841 William Clements age 29 farmer with wife Eliza age 35 and son Thomas age 2 at Cross Lane, Arnold. 1851 William Clement age 40 born Bradmore, groom, with wife Eliza age 48 born Wilford 1803 and children Thomas James 12, Eliza 8, William 6 scholars and Charles 3 all born Arnold plus visitor Charlotte Clements 55 married, farmer's wife (sister-in-law of William, wife of John born 1813 Bradmore, cottager) born Wilford, at Folly Road Arnold. 1861 William age 49 omnibus proprietor with wife Eliza age 58 and children Eliza age 9 dressmaker, William age 16 clerk to cotton merchant and Charles age 13 scholar at Foster Yard, Front St, Arnold. 1863 Jan qtr William Clements died, Basford district. 1871 William Clements age 26 clerk in warehouse born Arnold with mother Eliza age 68 housekeeper born Wilford at Woodbine Cottage Arnold. 1881 William Williamson age 44 publican born Arnold with wife Eliza age 34 born Arnold and mother Eliza Clements, widow age 78, annuitant born Wilford, at 27 Potters Hill, Aston, Warks. Eliza Clements born 1803 died 1886 Jan qtr Aston district.

John Clements bapt. 16.4.1813, son of Edward, labourer, and Sarah of Bradmore. 1851 John Clements age 37 gardener born Bradmore, at Wilford. (Wife Charlotte as visitor in brother William's house.) 1861 John age 47 cottager with wife Charlotte age 65 born Wilford, at Wilford. Charlotte Clements died Jan.1870, Basford district. 1871 John age 57 farmer, cottager born Bradmore with (2nd) wife Sarah A age 48 born Nottingham, no children, at Wilford. 1881 John age 67 cottager with wife Sarah A age 59, no children, at Wilford. John Clements born 1814 died 1888, Basford district. 1891 Sarah Ann Clements, widow age 67, cottager, with lodgers (husband and wife), at Wilford. Sarah Ann Clements born c1823 died Apr.qtr. 1897, Basford district.

Joseph Clements bapt. Bunny 17.11.1816, son of Edward, labourer, and Sarah of Bradmore. 1851 Joseph age 34 grazier born Bradmore with wife Ann age 35 born Leek, Staffs, and children Ann 6 scholar, John 4 both born Sneinton and Joseph 2 born Wilford, with a servant, at Wilford. 1861 Joseph age 45 farmer with wife Ann age 45 and children Ann 17, John 14 born Sneinton, Joseph 12, Eliza 9, William 7, Arthur 6 all born Wilford, Lucy 4 born Hickling, all scholars, living at Hickling Pastures. Not found 1871. Ann Clements born 1816 died July qtr 1878 Nottingham district. 1879 July qtr, Nottingham, Joseph Clements married Esther Bettney widow of Edward Bettney (died 1875). 1881 Joseph age 64 publican with wife Esther 59 born Nottingham and a servant at The Crown Inn, Arkwright St Nottingham. 1891 Joseph age 74 retired publican with wife Esther age 69 at 45 Wilford Grove, Nottingham. Joseph Clements born 1817 died July qtr 1895, Nottingham.

Elizabeth Clements, bapt. Bunny 16.4.1806, natural daughter of Alice of Bradmore.

CLIFTON

Thomas Clifton the younger, of Bradmore, yeoman, husbandman, left a will dated 26.4.1648, proved 21.11.1650, bond dated 1.6.1650. Thomas junior 1641 took Protestation Oath supporting true Protestant Religion (as did Thomas senior, but no other reference to him in Bradmore).

John Clifton bapt. 18.10.1640, son of Thomas Clifton junior and Elizabeth of Bradmore.

Thomas Clifton bapt. 11.12.1642, son of Thomas and Elizabeth of Bradmore. Possibly the Thomas married to Mary, living in Bradmore in 1670s/80s. George Archer and Mary wife of Thomas Clifton Nov.1684 presented for not coming to the parish church to hear divine service. 5.5.1685 Thomas Clifton of Bradmore husbandman presented for not paying levy of £1/3/4 and Mary his wife for not coming to her parish church at Easter last. June 1685 – Nov. 1685 Churchwardens Gervase Nixon and Richard Walker vs Thomas Clifton of Bradmore, farmer, libel regarding events up to June 1685. Interrogatories vs Thomas Clifton for non-payment of church dues. 6.10.1685 personal answers of Thomas Clifton. 30.11.1685 depositions by Richard Bush and Richard Waite, husbandmen of

Bradmore. 30.7.1685 Label re non-payment of dues by Thomas Clifton. 2.3.1686 Thomas Clifton sentenced for non-payment of church dues. 13.4.1686 Bill of costs re the above case. 27.4.1686 Mary wife of Thomas Clifton and George Archer of Bradmore presented for not receiving communion at Easter.

Mary Clifton bapt. Bunny 31.10.1676, daughter of Thomas and Mary of Bradmore.

John Clifton bapt. Bunny 12.2.1682, son of Thomas and Mary of Bradmore.

Elizabeth Clifton bapt. Bunny 24.2.1685, daughter of Thomas and Mary of Bradmore.

Margarett Clifton bapt. 2.11.1644, daughter of Thomas Clifton the younger of Bradmore.

? Clifton bapt. Bunny 17.1.1647, daughter of Thomas Clifton junior and Elizabeth of Bradmore.

Elizabeth Clifton bapt. Bunny 15.7.1649, daughter of Thomas Clifton junior and Elizabeth of Bradmore.

Marie Clifton was presented for absence from church for one month during the reigns of Charles II and James II (1660-1688). Possibly wife of Thomas, but no clear evidence to identify her.

Thomas Clifton, labourer, married to Mary, living in Bradmore in 1820.

Jane Clifton bapt. Bunny 4.8.1820, daughter of Thomas, labourer, and Mary of Bradmore.

COLLIN(G)S

Elizabeth Collins married Thomas Peting junior of Bunny at Bunny 1.12.1589.

Mary Collins bapt. Bunny 30.3.1820, daughter of Joseph, labourer, and Elizabeth of Bradmore.

George Collins born c1835, Bunny. 1851 age 16, single, agricultural labourer in the household of William Attenbrough, Debdale Farm (Bradmore 1851/1).

William Collins born c1845, Costock. 1851 age 4, scholar, in house of parents William, labourer and Ann at Bunny. 1861 age 16, single, cow boy in the household of Thomas Morris at Barn Close (Bradmore 1861/21). 1871 age 24 engine driver at steel works with wife Betsey nee Skinner age 28 stay maker born Easton Northants, children and sister in law at Brightside Bierlow, Sheffield. Subsequently labourer, local preacher (Stapleford), school caretaker and gardener (Nottingham). Died Apr.qtr.1902, Nottingham.

William Jex Collings, born c1870, Hammersmith, London, lace curtain draughtsman. Married Mary Bosworth daughter of William and Ann of Bradmore Jan.qtr. 1891, Nottingham district. 1891 age 21, married to Mary, in his father in law's house, Fairholme, on Main St. (Bradmore 1891/7). Appears on the electoral roll when his father-in-law died and his brother-in-law John took over Fairholme, probably moved out to set up his own household at this time. On electoral roll, house, 1898-1931/2, resident in Main St from 1920. 1900 Bunny Estate rental has William Collings Junr with cottage and garden paying £3/10/- rent pa, and paying same rent in 1908 Bunny Estate rental. 1901 William age 31 head of household, highway labourer, with wife Mary and children William 9, Thomas 7, Percy 4 and Edith 1 in 4-room house on Village St (Main St) (Bradmore 31/1901). 1904 parish councillor. Possibly the Collins of Bradmore recorded in the Bunny & Bradmore Charities minutes as receiving £1 from the Charities on account of his illness, Feb.1905. 1911 William age 43 bricklayer's labourer in agriculture, born Hammersmith, with wife Mary age 43 and children William 20 farm labourer, Percy 15 farm labourer, Edith 12, John 9, Winnie 7, scholars, Charlie 4, Daisy 2, all born Bradmore 4-room house (Bradmore 28/1911).

William Collings born Bradmore 1892 son of William and Mary. Methodist Sunday School scholar Vestry Boys 25.8.1895-26.4.1896 and 5.7.1896 – June 1898, 3rd class July 1898 – June 1901, 2nd class July 1901 – Dec.1903, 1st class Jan.1904 – Dec.1905.1901 age 9 scholar in parents' house (Bradmore 31/1901). 1911 age 20 farm labourer in parents' house (Bradmore 28/1911). Billy and Tom Collins played fox-and-hounds with John P Smeeton down Moor Lane, c.1890s (J P Smeeton).

Thomas B Collings, born Bradmore 15.1.1894, son of William and Mary. See note above under William per John P Smeeton. Methodist Sunday School scholar Vestry Boys 23.1.1898-June 1901, 3rd class July 1901-June 1902, 2nd class July 1902-Dec.1905. Received 'Early Days' book 1901. 1901 age 7 scholar in parents' house (Bradmore 31/1901). 1906 joined Methodist choir. 1911 age 17, single, working on farm, in house of uncle John Bosworth (Bradmore 31/1911). Able Seaman, Royal Navy HMS Contest, No.J.15112 (Dev). Killed in enemy action 18.9.1917, body not recovered, location of grave not known, mother Mary notified. Commemorated in Bradmore Methodist Church and on Bunny war memorial 1914-18 war.

Percy John Collin(g)s born Bradmore c1897 son of William and Mary. Methodist Sunday School

Ruth Emma Collings nee Clarke, born 1897, daughter of James, bricklayer's labourer, and Emma, seamer of hosiery, of East Leake, married Percy John Collings in 1922. 1901 Ruth Emma age 4 born Costock in parents' house at Castle Hill, East Leake. 1911 Ruth Emma age 14 born East Leake, servant for Arthur Martin, chemist, at 23 Market Place, Loughborough.

Edith Mary Collings born Bradmore c1900, daughter of William and Mary. 1901 age 1 in parents' house (Bradmore 31/1901). Methodist Sunday School scholar Vestry girls 15.11.1903-2.7.1904. 3rd class July – Dec 1904, 19.2.1905-Dec.1905. Admitted to Bunny School 20.2.1905. 1911 age 12 scholar in parents' house (Bradmore 28/1911).

John Edward Collings born Bradmore c1903 son of William and Mary. Methodist Sunday School listed from 1912 but no attendances until 1st class July 1914-Apr 1915, absent sick to Sept, Sept 1915-Dec.1916, intermittent to May 1917.1911 age 9 scholar in parents' house (Bradmore 28/1911).

Winnie (Winnifred Ellen) Collings born Bradmore Mar.qtr. 1905Basford district, daughter of William and Mary. 1911 age 7 scholar in parents' house (Bradmore 28/1911).

Charles Frederick Collings born Bradmore June qtr. 1907 son of William and Mary. 1911 Charlie age 4 in parents' house (Bradmore 28/1911).

Daisy Collings born Mar.qtr. 1910 Bradmore daughter of William and Mary. 1911 age 2 in parents' house (Bradmore 28/1911).

COLLINGTON

William Collington, born Wymeswold c1848 son of William, farm labourer, and Elizabeth of Wymeswold. 1851 age 3 in parents' house at Little End, Wymeswold. 1861 age 13 plough boy in parents' house at Church Lane, Wymeswold. 1871 age 23 single farm servant for Thomas Bennett farmer of 80 acres at Burton on the Wolds, Leics. 1881 age 33, unmarried, indoor servant in the household of William and Eliza Bagguley at Yorke Farm (Bradmore 1881/1). 1891 William age 33 gen.lab. born Wymeswold with wife Ruth age 26 born London and children Frances 7, Edward 5, scholars born Wymeswold, and Sarah 3 born Loughborough, at 20 Steeple Row, Loughborough.

COOK(E)

Ann Cooke nee Peet born c1803/4 daughter of Thomas and Ann, married George Cook(e) of Nottingham. 1851 George age 37 coach proprietor with wife Ann age 47 born Bradmore and children George 14, Thomas P 11, Charles 9, Ann Mary 7 scholars all born Leicester, at 16 Belvoir St., Leicester. 1861 George age 47 post horse proprietor with wife Ann age 58 and children George 24 groom, Tom Peet Cook 21 pawnbroker's apprentice, Charles 19, Ann Mary 17 all born Leicester and nephew George Peet, son of Ann's brother John and Hannah, plus a servant at 19 Halford St., Leicester.

Samuel Cook(e) born c1838 East Leake, son of John, farmer and carrier, and Sarah of Gotham Lane, East Leake. 1861 age 24 farm labr. at parents' house, East Leake. 1871 age 33, carrier, with wife Ann age 33 and nephew George S Foster 4 scholar born Nottingham at West St, East Leake. 1881 Samuel age 43 domestic gardener with wife Ann age 43 and son Charles 10 scholar born Basford, at 16 Jenner St Basford. 1891 age 54 gardener with wife Ann and lodger at 4 Bywell St., Nottingham. On electoral roll, house, 1896-1907. 1900 Bunny Estate Rental has Samuel with cottage and garden paying £2 pa rent. 1901 Samuel age 63 born East Leake, ag.lab, with wife Ann in 4 room house on Village St (Main St.) (Bradmore 41/1901). July 1906 Bunny & Bradmore Charities Trustees resolved that Samuel Cook be allowed to occupy an Alms House. Samuel Cooke died Apr.qtr. 1908 Basford district.

Ann Cook born c1838 Bunny, married Samuel. 1881 age 43 married to Samuel. 1891 age 54 married to Samuel. 1901 age 63 married to Samuel. Ann Cook died Apr qtr 1906, Basford district.

COOPER

Betsy Cooper nee Challands, born c1887, Bradmore, daughter of William and Nancy. 1907 July qtr. Betsey Challands married Herbert Cooper son of Matthew, general labourer, and Sarah Jane of Edwalton. 1911 Herbert Cooper age 27 carter for UDC born West Bridgford with wife Betsey age 24 born Bradmore (married 3 years with 2 children), Herbert William 3 and Sidney 1 both born West Bridgford, with mother Sarah Jane Cooper 49 widow born Granby, at 19 Edwalton Ave West Bridgford, 4-room house. Her daughter Dolly drove a steam train at Rushcliffe Country Park to celebrate her 82nd birthday, and did charity work at QMC.

COPE

Edward Cope born c1864 Edingley, Notts son of Edward, farmer of 31 acres and Maria, of Edingley. Oct qtr 1886 Basford district married Elizabeth Buxton Of Bradmore, daughter of Thomas, framework knitter, and Jane. 1891 age 28, gardener, with wife Lizzie and children Horace 3 born Beeston, Lawrence 9 mths born Basford, visitor Annie Cope single ae 22 dressmaker born Edingley, at 1 Charlesworths Cottages, Basford. 1901 Edward age 35 nurse gardener with wife Lizzie and children Horace E 13 born Beeston, William L 10 born Basford, visitor Ethel M Hutchinson 20 dressmaker on own account born Nottingham, at 23 Middleton Rd, Beeston. 1911 Edward age 47 market gardener employer with wife Elizabeth, son William Lawrence 20 single asst in gardens, plus domestic servant, boarder and 2 visitors at Edingley, Southwell, house with 6 rooms.

Elizabeth (Lizzie) Cope born 1869 Bradmore, nee Buxton daughter of Thomas and Jane. Married Oct qtr 1887 to Edward Cope. 1891 Lizzie age 24 married to Edward. 1901 Lizzie age 31 married to Edward. 1911 Elizabeth age 43 married to Edward (24 years, 2 children).

CORBET

John Corbet of Bradmore 1641 noted in the Protestation Return as a recusant, i.e. dissenter, refusing to attend Church of England services.

Rebeckah Corbet had 2/- p.wk. from the Constable Jan.1812-1819.

CORBRY

Thomas Corby born Sept.qtr. 1849 Swarby near Culverthorpe, Sleaford district, Lincs, son of Thomas, farm labourer and Eliza of Culverthorpe. 1871 age 21, single, indoor farm servant for Joseph Bosworth at Rancliffe Farm (Bradmore 1871/1). 1879 Apr.qtr. Sleaford district, married Mary Ann White. 1881 age 29 ag.lab with wife Mary age 26 and son Thomas 11 mths at Digby Fen, Sleaford. 1891 age 40 ag.foreman with wife Mary age 35 born Sleaford and children Thomas 10, William 9, Lucy 7, Eliza 5, Jessie 3, Christopher 1 all born Bloxholme, at Bloxholme Lincs. 1901 age 49 farm foreman with wife Mary age 46 and children Thomas 20 steam cultivator born Digby Fen, Lucy 18 domestic cook, Jessie 13, Christopher 11, Alice 9, Frederick 7, Nelly 5 and Elizabeth 2 born Bloxhome, at Bloxholme. 1911 age 60 shepherd with wife Mary age 55 (married 32 years with 10 children), and children Christopher 21 farm labourer, Nellie 14 nursemaid, Annie age 12 scholar, and visitor (mother in law) Ann White 69, widow, born Osbournby Lincs, at Bloxholme.

George Cotterill died. 1891 Sarah Cotterill, widow age 49 born Bradmore with children George 16 shoemaker's apprentice, Richard 14 coalminer, Charles 12 scholar all born Sheffield, plus Charles Antony, grandson 3 born Dronfield, and a lodger at Quort Green, Dronfield. 1901 Sarah age 59 widow with son Ben Key widower 31 gen.lab. born Sheffield, George Cotterill 26 cordwainer on own account at home, Charles Key 22 moulder's labourer, grandson Harry Key 10 all born Sheffield, and grand-daughter Delilas Key ae 7 born Dronfield, at Skinnerthorpe Rd, Brightside, Sheffield. 1903 Jan.qtr. Sarah Cotterill died.

COULTER

William Coulter of Bradmore, will administered and bond given 13.4.1705. No other information.

COWE

Nathaniel Cowe took Protestation Oath 1641. Married Isabell.

Diana Cowe bapt. Bunny 12.4.1640, daughter of Nathaniel Cowe and Isabell of Bradmore. Married Richard Archer, both of Bradmore, at Bunny 28.11.1665. See Archer. Sister of Elizabeth who married a Rhoadely. Sister of Isabell christened Bunny 7.1.1733.

Alice Cowe married John Benett of Bunny at Bunny 27.11.1648, probably daughter of Nathaniel and Isabell.

COWEN

Henry John Cowen, born c1845 in Hartlepool, Durham, son in law of Thomas Buxton, husband of Catherine. 1881 age 36, engineer, living with Thomas Buxton on the Loughborough Rd. north of the

Crown Inn (Bradmore 1881/6). 1891 Henry John Cowan age 44 engine fitter born Hartlepool with wife Kate age 39 born Bradmore and children William A 15 joiner's apprentice and Henry 1 both born Stockton at 14 Millbank S.t, Stockton on Tees. 1901 Henry John Cowan age 54 engine fitter with wife Catherine age 48 born Bradmore and son Henry 11 born Stockton at 11 Worthing St, Stockton on Tees. 1911 Henry John Cowan age 66 marine engine fitter with wife Kate age 57 born Bradmore (married 37 years with 2 children), and son William Andrew 35 single commercial traveller (timber) living with them at 2 Sydenham Rd., Stockton on Tees, 6-room house.

Catherine/Kate Cowen born 1851 in Bradmore, daughter of Thomas and Mary Buxton, married Henry John Cowen Oct qtr 1874, Hartlepool. 1881 age 29, living with Thomas Buxton, with her husband and son William (Bradmore 1881/6). 1891 Kate age 39 married to Henry John at Stockton on Tees. 1901 Catherine age 48 married to Henry John at Stockton on Tees. 1911 Kate age 57 married to Henry John 37 years, with 2 children, at Stockton on Tees.

William Andrew Cowen, born c1876 at Stockton on Tees, son of Henry John and Catherine, grandson of Thomas Buxton. 1881 age 5, scholar, living with grandfather Thomas Buxton (Bradmore 1881/6). 1891 age 15 joiner's apprentice at parents' house, Stockton on Tees. 1901 William A Cowan age 26 joiner carpenter, visitor to David Roberts, carpenter and wife Mary at 3 Walton Rd., West Molesey, Surrey. 1911 age 35, single, commercial traveller (timber) in parents' house, Stockton on Tees.

Henry Cowen born 1890, Stockton on Tees, son of Henry John and Catherine, grandson of Thomas Buxton of Bradmore. 1891 age 1 in parents' house, Stockton on Tees. 1901 age 11 in parents' house, Stockton on Tees. 1911 age 21, single, County Council school teacher born Stockton, boarder with John Robson, Council road foreman, and wife Mary at Viewfield House, High Speen, Chopwell Durham, 8-room house. 5.11.1916 signed on for short war service at Newcastle on Tyne, Service No. 146679, age 26, schoolteacher of 22 Linden Ave, Stockton on Tees, appointed as supply clerk to ASC Aldershot 17.11.1915.

CRAGGE

William Cragg married to Jean, living in Bradmore in 1650s/60s.

Nathaniel Crag bapt. Bunny 6.9.1655, son of William and Jean of Bradmore.

Ffrancis Crag bapt. Bunny 21.12.1656, son of William and Jen of Bradmore.

Mary Cragge bapt. at Bunny 20.11.1660, daughter of William and Jene.

Jane Cragg married Thomas Golldin (Golding) of Bunny at Bunny 12.8.1662.

John Cragg bapt. at Bunny 15.6.1690, son of William and Jane.

CRESSWELL

Alice Cresswell married Robert Ragge of Diseworth at Bunny 5.5.1599.

Edward and John Cresswell of Bunny with Bradmore took Protestation Oath in 1641, but no specific references to links with Bradmore.

Jane Cressell married John Tomlinn or Tomlinson, both of Bradmore, at Bunny 9.11.1663.

CRIPWELL

Richard Cripwell of Bradmore married Sarah Murden of Ruddington at Ruddington 5.9.1811. Their daughter Martha, bapt. Ruddington 4.6.1817, married Richard Marshall of Ruddington 28.11.1836. Richard and Sarah's other children were Ann born 1813, Sarah born 1816, Richard born 1819, and John born 1822, all in Ruddington. (Ref: Ancestry of William George Plowright by Jamie Colville, Oct 1999.)

CROFTS

Sarah Crofts of Bradmore born c 1794. 3.11.1843 the Constable paid 5/- for taking Sarah Crofts to the workhouse, and April 1844 paid another 5/-, but received 3/- for Sarah in the same year. 11 April he paid John Davies 2/- lodging for Sarah. 4.9.1844 another 3/- expenses taking her to the workhouse. 1851 age 57, servant in Basford Union House (Basford 1851, Union House).

Mary Crofts of Bradmore buried Bunny 1.6.1808.

William Crofts of Bradmore buried Bunny 10.11.1808.

William Crafts recorded in the Constable's accounts, 28.2.1808 received cash 10/6, and on 7.3.1808 had 7/-. 4.4.1808 the Constable paid William Hart for fetching Crafts' goods, 12/-, and expenses and tollbars 7/1½d. 18.4.1808 the Constable paid 2 weeks for his child at 5/-, payments continuing through to May. 23.7.1808 4/- expenses for the Constable going to Nottingham with Crofts. 10.4.1809 coals fetched for Crafts cost 6/-. July 1816 Constable incurred expenses of 3/- going to Radford to see Crafts. Jan.1817, William Crafts paid by the Constable for making fires in the Watch House, 3/-, and the

Constable also paid the cost of candles. 1830 the Constable paid Crofts' Club money, 7/6. 1833/4 he received £2 for the sale of William Crofts' goods.

Thomas Crafts recorded in Constable's accounts 1809, paying previous year's levy £1/10/4, possibly on behalf of William. A Thomas Crofts or Crafts married Mary Savidge at Bunny 13 or 30.11.1809, but no firm evidence to link with the Bradmore Thomas.

William Crofts born c1831. The 'Crofts' boy' who appears in the Constables Accounts. 1838 the Constable paid Mr Spencer 3/6 p.wk. for him, and for making 2 shirts and a new suit of clothes 7/6, a cap 9d, a pair of stockings 1/3. March 1839 he had a new frock, 4/3. 1840 a cap 10d and trousers 4/-. 1841 age 10, servant in the household of John Glover, farmer, Bonsers Farm (1841/76). 1841 the Constable paid D Armstrong for washing and mending for him, for shirts and stockings 3/6, to D Armstrong for making 2 shirts and a frock 6/1, and paid for stockings, handkerchiefs and cap for him. 1842 paid for washing 13/-, and a suit of clothes 15/-. Paid Sam Dalby for mending his trousers 1/4, and bought a hat for 1/4. 1843 D Armstrong was paid for washing and mending for him and making shirts. 17.6.1843 the Constable paid 2/6 to fetch William Crofts out of the workhouse. the Constable paid 2/6 for flannel for him. 5.12.1843 paid 5/- for taking him to the workhouse. 3.3.1844 again 2/6 for taking him into the workhouse.

CROSS

Henrie Crosse late churchwarden of Bradmore 6.7.1622 presented for not giving account of his office last Easter.

William Cross born c1772, buried Bunny 17.4.1832 age 60.

Joseph Cross, mentioned in Constables Accounts Dec.1789, when the Constable paid 3 men 3/- for taking care of Joseph, and 1790 the Constable spent 6d when Joseph Cross paid his money - the Constables Accounts records a receipt of £6 that year from Joseph Cross, no details. 1792 John Glover went to Chilwell for Cross's money in April, and claimed 1/- expenses. Accounts record another £5 receipt from Joseph Cross. 1793 accounts show receipt of £4 for Joseph Cross's money.

William Cross born c1805, Willoughby, married Ann Stubbs, both of Bradmore, 18.6.1831, witnessed Anne Cross, John Stubbs. 1851 age 46, miller and grocer at Wilford Lane, Ruddington, married to Ann with children Sarah Ann 18, William, miller, 17, Richard 7, George 5, Emmily 3, all born Ruddington. William died before 1861 census, exact date not known.

Ann Cross born Bradmore 1809 nee Stubbs, daughter of William and Sarah, married William 18.6.1831. Grandmother of John William Cross of Wilford Rd., Ruddington, baker and grocer. 1851 age 41 married to William at Wilford Lane, Ruddington. 1861 age 51, shopkeeper, widow, at 1 Wilford Rd., Ruddington with daughter Sarah 28, son George 15, both born Ruddington. 1871 age 61, widow, grocer, with unmarried daughter Sarah Ann 37, grocer, son Richard 27, baker, and grand-daughter Sarah Jane 10, scholar, at Marl Pit Ruddington. 1881 age 71 in grandson John William's household at Ruddington. Ann Cross born 1809 died Apr.qtr. 1881, Basford district.

John William Cross born 1859 Ruddington, son of William and Eliza, grandson of William and Ann. 1861 age 2 in parents' house, William Cross age 27 miller (corn) and wife Eliza age 28 born Nottingham, with sister Sarah Jane age 4 mths at 8 Wilford St., Ruddington. 1871 John William age 12 scholar with sister Emma both born Ruddington in grandparents' house, William Shelton age 58 farmer of 205 acres employing 3 labourers and 2 boys born Ruddington and wife Sarah age 60 born Clifton, with their children Reuben 24 and Emma 28 born Ruddington, and grand-daughter Sarah Ann Hibbert 7 scholar plus 3 servants, at The Field, Ruddington. 1881 John William age 22 baker and grocer, with sister Sarah Jane 20 aunt Emily Cross 38 schoolmistress and grandmother Ann Cross age 71, at Wilford Rd, Ruddington. 1891 John William age 32 grocer and baker with wife Mary age 28 born Melbourne Derbys, children Margaret 3, Robert William 1 born Ruddington and servant Ada Cross 14 born Melbourne Derbys, at grocer's shop, Marlpit, Ruddington. 1901 John William age 42 widower, baker, grocer, shopkeeper, employer working at home with children Margaret 13, Robert William 11, and 5 other children all under 10 years old, plus sister Annie Cross 32, at Wilford Road, Ruddington. 1911 John William age 52 baker employer with wife Dora Elizabeth age 38 born Peterborough (married 7 years with 1 child), with 6 of Mary's children and 1 of Dora's, at Wilford Rd., Ruddington.

Emma Cross, born c1864, Ruddington, daughter of William and Eliza Cross, grand-daughter of William and Ann Cross and of William and Sarah Shelton. 1881 age 16 housekeeper for grandfather William Shelton, with Leonard Cross, at Plumtree. 1885 Methodist Sunday School teacher, 4th class girls, to Dec.1887. 1891 age 27, single, housekeeper, in the household of grandfather William Shelton, in one of the cottages on Loughborough Rd. north of the Forge (Bradmore 1891/47). 1901 age 36 needlewoman on own account living alone on High S.t, Ruddington. 1911 age 46, single, no occupation, living alone on The Green, Ruddington, 4-room house.

Leonard Cross, born c1877, Ruddington, grandson of William Shelton. 1881 age 4 living with grandfather William Shelton at Plumtree. Bradmore Methodist Sunday School scholar 2nd class 5.7.1885-June 1887, 1st class July 1887-Jan.1888, 1st class 2nd part Jan.1888-July 1889, 1st class July 1889-March 1891, 1st class 1st part March 1891-23.4.1891, left. 1891 age 14, single, employed on the land, agricultural, in his grandfather's house (Bradmore 1891/47). 1901 age 24 farm labourer with wife Eliza Ann age 25 born Clifton and daughter Lucy Emma 1 born Ruddington at Easthorpe St., Ruddington. 1911 age 33, cowman, with wife Mary S age 28 married 1 year with 1 child, born Shirland Derbys., children Lucy 11 scholar born Ruddington, Leonard 1 born Stoke Bardolph, at Stoke Bardolph.

Thomas Cross bapt. 17.7.1831 son of William, miller, and Ann, buried 21.7.1831, infant.

Emily Cross born 12.4.1842, Ruddington, daughter of Ann and William. 1851 Emily age 3 in parents' house – should be 8? 1861 Emily Cross age 18 student at Diocesan Training School, New Uttoxeter Road, Derby. 1871 age 28 schoolmistress, single, solo at Pockthorpe, Melton Magna, Norfolk. 1881 age 38 schoolmistress with niece Sarah Jane 20 single, nephew John William Cross 22 baker and grocer (head of household) and mother Ann Cross ae 71, widow, housekeeper born Bradmore, at Wilford Road, Ruddington. 1891 Emily age 48 single, certificated Teacher, elementary school, lodging with William Smith, hosiery manufacturer, and wife Catherine on High St, Ruddington. 1901 age 58, retired schoolmistress, boarding with Daniel Sherwin, forge labourer, and wife at 5, Brighton Road, Alvaston, Derbyshire. 1911 Emily age 68, single, retired schoolmistress, probably boarder with John Thomas Bowers journeyman milkman at 134 St Albans Road, Arnold, Nottingham. Wrote a letter dated 10.4.1924 referring to her 82nd birthday due on Saturday 12.4.1924, writing from c/o Mrs Blow, The Green, Ruddington, to Miss Grace Waite with details of Bradmore connections: 'I think I should have told you that my mother's family lived at Bradmore ... her antecedents were buried at Bunny - Mrs Wilkins Smith had a church room attached to the old steeple in my grandfather's garden and had sales of needlework in my cousin's house.... I knew the Misses Hawksley through my relative at Bradmore and once attended the old Church at Ruddington on Tuesday evenings and sat in the same pew. I have helped Miss Parkyns at the Hall at a Bazaar. The doings at the hall in the time of King Charles 1st were known at my father's old home at Willoughby on the Wolds. My father's forefathers lived there hundreds of years, my Grandfather could repeat what former generations had recorded, I think of generations are buried in Willoughby Churchyard. Of course they helped the Royalists as did those at Bradmore. Both were farmers but at Bradmore saddlers and harness makers also and came in contact with the Royalists. We always had great respect for the whole of the family...' References to the Stubbs family, saddlers, who lived on Far St. next to the church steeple, grandparents William and Sarah. Transcript of letter held in the Thomas Parkyns files in Nottm Univ. Library. Emily died June qtr 1925, Basford district, age 83.

Louisa Ann Cross born Dec.qtr. 1859, daughter of Joseph and Jane (b.Bradmore, possibly nee Attewell.) 1861 Joseph Cross age 40 born Strelley, groom at livery stables with wife Jane 30 born Bradmore, children Jane 4, Louisa 1 at Chapel Place, Castlegate Nottingham. 1871 Joseph age 40 livery stable keeper, Jane 40 born Bradmore, children Jane 14 dressmaker, Louisa Ann 11, Charles 9, scholars born Nottingham, at Clayton Square Nottingham. 1881 Joseph age 50 ostler with wife Jane 51 born Bradmore and children Jane 24 dressmaker, Louisa Ann age 21 milliner and Charles age 19 carrier at 8 Clayton Square, Nottingham. Louisa Ann died 12.4.1881 aged 21.

CUMBERLAND

Mary Cumberland born c1722, buried 9.1.1799 as widow of Bradmore aged 77. Possibly the Mary Cumberland 8.8.1794 in the Constables Accounts, 3/- for Mary Cumberland's examination and expenses, and for taking her to Wysall and expenses 14/-.

Matthew Cumberland joint executor of the will of Richard Henson, 1734.

Ann Cumberland of Bradmore, born c1737, married Matthew, probably at Bunny 18.5.1783, possibly as widow of Joseph Priestley (see Priestley). Buried Bunny 28.8.1787, died aged 50.

Elizabeth Cumberland of Bradmore born c1754, buried Bunny 5.5.1822 age 68.

Mary Cumberland married Thomas Bosworth at Bunny 26.5.1766, no parish specified. Mary of Bradmore, born c1746, buried Bunny 27.4.1788 as wife of Thomas, died age 42.

Matthew Cumberland received payment from Constable in 1784 for catching crows, and 1794 for catching sparrows.

William Cumberland paid by the Constable in 1790, 1791, 1795, 1800 and 1801 for catching sparrows, and for a hedgehog in 1801.

Matthew Cumberland married Elizabeth Bennet both of Bradmore at Bunny 31.1.1788. 1784 Common Fine commonly paid at St Michaelmas includes 1½d gathered from Matthew Cumberland. In 1792 Bunny Estate Survey with 10 acres 3 roods 30 perches paying £9/13/1 rent pa including £1/8/0 for

house, outbuildings, garden, foldyard and croft, near the top end of Main St. Possibly the Matthew Cumberland who appears in the Bunny Troop of Volunteer Cavalry 1798-1818, serving 20 days, paid £1. Buried Bunny 16.12.1805. Will of Matthew, husbandman, dated 28.11.1805, proved 20.10.1806, executors widow Elizabeth and son William. Left £20 to his daughter Elizabeth when she is 20, the rest equally to his wife Elizabeth and son William. Witnessed by John Dalby and Henry Price. Death duty recorded 20.10.1806.

Elizabeth Cumberland born 1754 nee Bennet, daughter of William and Mary, married Matthew 31.1.1788, executrix of his will in 1806.

William Cumberland born 3.11.1788, Bradmore, bapt. Bunny 13.11.1788, son of Matthew, cottager, and Elizabeth. Joint executor and beneficiary of his father's will, 1806. William, labourer and cottager, married (1) Sarah by 1813, with children born up to 1827. Possibly the Cumberland paid by the Constable in 1825 for dyking 76 acres, £4/2/4 at 1/1 per acre. Sarah died 1829. William Cumberland married (2) Jane Attewell, widow, both of Bradmore, 3.12.1832. Witnessed by Gervis Bosworth. 1841 William age 50 born Notts with wife Jane age 50 not born Notts and Jane's daughter Rebecca Attewell age 15 born Notts, in Bradmore (Bradmore 1841/45, listed between William Marriott and John Stevenson). 1851 as Cumberlin, age 65, farm labourer, married to Jane with Jane's grand-daughter Emmelia Attewell (Bradmore 1851/21). 1861 age 73, agricultural labourer, married to Jane, possibly living at Steeple Cottage, Main St. (Bradmore 1861/48). Buried Bunny 4.2.1864 age 74.

Sarah Cumberland born c1791, buried Bunny 23.8.1829 age 38, married to William.

Mary Cumberland, bapt. Bunny 4.11.1813 daughter of William, labourer, and Sarah of Bradmore. 1841 Mary age 25 female servant for Rev Luke Jackson at Nuthall Rectory. 1851 Mary age 36 born Bradmore, cook for John Watson (silk throwster and partner in F B Gill & Co, manager in J&J Wright & Co Bank Nottingham and agent for Guardian Fire & Life Insurance Co) at The Villa, Beeston. 1852 Apr.qtr. Basford Mary Cumberland married (2) John Swain, widower, of Castle Donnington. 1861 John Swain age 49 lacemaker born Castle Donnington with wife Mary 46 born Bradmore and daughter Mary Jane 7 scholar born Nottingham, lodging with Isaac Clifton proprietor of house at 7 Kirkwhite St., Nottingham. 1871 John Swain age 59 baker with wife Mary age 57? born Nottingham and daughter Mary 17 lacemaker born Beeston, at Agnes St., Nottingham. Mary died 1879 Jan qtr, Nottingham. 1881 John Swain age 69 widow baker with daughter Mary J 27 born Beeston and grandchildren Louisa 13 and John 7 scholars born Liverpool (presumably from his first marriage) plus boarder at 134 Arkwright St., Nottingham. John Swain died 1883 Jul.qtr., Nottingham.

Ann Cumberland, bapt. Bunny 24.10.1815 daughter of William, labourer, and Sarah of Bradmore.

John Cumberland bapt. Bunny 9.3.1818 son of William, cottager, and Sarah of Bradmore. 1841 John Cumberland age 20 labourer with wife Ann age 20 and daughter Mary 5 mths at Keyworth. 1851 John age 32 born Bradmore, ag.lab., with wife Ann age 34 born Keyworth and children William 6, John 4 and Edward 1 all born Keyworth. 1861 age 42, householder, agricultural labourer, married to Sarah; described as father in law of Frederick Wollerton age 10 (possibly an earlier child of Sarah's). With children Ann, John and Sarah, on Far St. (Bradmore 1861/40). 1867 Bunny Estate rental, renting house and garden at £2/10/- pa. 1871 age 52, agricultural labourer, widower, with daughter Ann (Bradmore 1871/30). 1880 being ill, was granted 2/6 p.wk. 24.6.1880-31.5.1881 from Bunny & Bradmore Charities, and probably referred to in 1879 receiving 2/4 p.wk. 12.4.1879-17.6.1879. Buried Bunny 18.10.1880 age 64.

Ann Cumberland born 1817 Keyworth, married to John by 1841. 1841 age 20 married to John. 1851 age 34 married to John. Died before 1861.

Mary Cumberland born 1840 daughter of John and Ann. 1841 age 5 mths in parents' house. No further record found.

Ann Cumberland born c1842, Keyworth, daughter of John and Ann. 1861 age 19, single, seamstress in parents' house (Bradmore 1861/40). 1871 age 25, single, in father's house (Bradmore 1871/30). Buried Bunny 20.10.1879 age 37.

William Cumberland born c1845, son of John and Ann. 1851 age 6 in parents' house at Keyworth. Buried Bunny 11.3.1861 age 16, died just before 1861 census.

John Cumberland born c1847, Keyworth, son of John and Ann. 1851 age 4 in parents' house at Keyworth. 1861 age 15, carter's boy, in parents' house (Bradmore 1861/40).

Edward Cumberland, born c1850 at either Bradmore (ref 1871 and 1881) or Keyworth (ref 1891 and 1901) son of John and Ann, born while they were at Keyworth,. 1851 age 1 in parents' house at Keyworth. 1861 possibly the Edward "Smith", servant, age 10 cowboy born Keyworth in the household of George Smith and family, farm man, at Farm House, Costock? 1871 Edward age 22 ag.lab. born Bradmore working for Benjamin Howard farmer of 200 acres at Edwalton. 1874

Oct.qtr., Southwell district, Edward Cumberland married Mary Glazebrook of Lowdham. May have moved into Bradmore in 1881 after his father died, as his earlier children are born at Lowdham, but from 1882 onwards born at Bradmore. 1881 age 28, recorded born at Bradmore, householder, general labourer, married to Mary, with children Michael Glasbrook, Mary Elizabeth and Mary Ann (Bradmore 1881/27). 1891 age 41, noted born Keyworth, agricultural labourer, in house of 4 rooms on Far St., but married to Mary from Lowdham (assumed same person) with children Annie, Edith, William and Rose (Bradmore 1891/24). 1891 the Cumberlands were awarded a ton of coals from the Bunny & Bradmore Charities in January, and Edward Cumberland was also awarded a ton of coals at the usual time in October. 1895 received a share of the funds left after purchase of charity Christmas coals. Electoral roll with house 1886-1904. Neddie Cumberland, who worked as a stonebreaker, was injured when he fell from the front of a cart or wagon on Gotham Lane, Bunny, and was run over by the cart, never recovered from his injuries (J P Smeeton). 1900 Bunny Estate Rental has E Cumberland with cottage and garden paying £2/10/- rent pa., and 1908 Bunny Estate rental paying 10/- pa rent. 1901 Edward age 49, farm lab., with wife Mary and children Edith and Rose, in a house with 4 rooms on Village St. Bradmore (Bradmore 10/1901).

Mary Cumberland, born c1854 at Lowdham, nee Glazebrook, daughter of Michael, stocking framework knitter, and Edith of Lowdham. 1861 age 8, scholar, in parents' house at Lowdham. 1871 age 18, no marital status recorded, domestic servant unemployed born Lowdham, in mother's house, Edith age 53 widow, domestic servant; also Edith's grandson Michael 1 mth born Lowdham, at Lowdham. Married Edward Cumberland 1874 Oct. qtr, Southwell district. 1881 age 27, married to Edward (Bradmore 1881/27). 1891 age 37 married to Edward (Bradmore 1891/24). 1897-1905 caretaker for the Methodist church. 1901 age 48 married to Edward (Bradmore 10/1901). On electoral roll, house, no parish vote, 1905-1908.

Michael Glasbrook, born c1871 at Lowdham, son of Edward and Mary. 1881 age 10, scholar in Edward and (mother) Mary Cumberland's house (Bradmore 1881/27). 1891 Michael Glazebrook age 20, labourer at gasworks, born Lowdham, boarder with William Brown, milkman, at 28 Radcliffe St, Nottingham. 1898 Jan qtr Michael Glazebrook married Lily Harwood, Basford district.

(Mary) Elizabeth Cumberland born c1876 at Lowdham, daughter of Edward and Mary. 1881 age 5, scholar in parents' house (Bradmore 1881/27). Elizabeth Methodist Sunday School scholar 2nd class July 1885-Dec.1896, 1st class Jan-June 1887, 21st class 2nd part July 1887-Oct 1888, 1st class Jan.1889-24.3.1889, left. Married 22.5.1893 aged 17, to Samuel Frogg, 21, collier of Riddings Derbyshire son of Samuel, blacksmith.

Mary Ann (Annie) Cumberland, born c1881 at Lowdham, daughter of Edward, labourer, and Mary. 1881 age 1 in parents' house (1881/27). Methodist Sunday School scholar 4th class 5.7.1885 – Dec.1886, 3rd class Jan.1887-July 1888, 2nd class July 1888-June 1890 then intermittent attendances July 1890-June 1891. Intermittent 1st class 2nd cpart July 1891-June 1893, 1st class July 1893-13.8.1893 and final entry 1.7.1894, left. 1891 entered as Annie, age 11, scholar in parents' house (Bradmore 1891/24). Married 11.4.1898 aged 18, to John Harvey Daft, aged 22, farm servant of Ruddington, son of Josiah Daft framework knitter. Witnessed by Michael Glazebrook and Edith Annie Daft.

Edith Cumberland, born 21.10.1882, Bradmore, bapt. 20.11.1882 Bradmore Methodist Church, daughter of Edward and Mary. Methodist Sunday School scholar 4th class 5.12.1886-June 1887, 5th class July-Dec.1887, 4th class Jan 1888-July 1889, 3rd class July 1889-June 1890, 2nd class July 1890-Dec.1894, 1st class Jan.1895-Dec.1897. Joined the Methodist choir 1894. Returned thanks 20.3.1898. Sunday School teacher June 1898-Dec.1899. 1901 received 'Methodists Welcome'. 1891 age 8, scholar in parents' house (Bradmore 1891/24). 1901 age 18, hosiery handworker in parents' house (Bradmore 10/1901). 1904 Jan.qtr. Edith Cumberland married Thomas Godber, Basford district. 1911 Thomas Godber age 38 coal miner, hewer, born Alfreton, with wife Edith age 28 born Bradmore, married 7 years with 2 children, Thomas 6, Evelyn 1 both born Somercotes, plus lodger, at Lea Brooks, Alfreton, 5-room house.

William Cumberland, born c1887, Bradmore, son of Edward and Mary. 1891 age 4, scholar in parents' house (Bradmore 1891/24). Methodist Sunday School scholar Vestry Boys 26.10.1890-25.6.1893 (absent Jan.1891), 3rd class Jul.1893-Dec.1895, 2nd class Jan 1896-June 1899 (sick Oct.1897), 1st class intermittent July 1899-3.6.1900. 1901 age 14, farm servant with horses working for Edwin Harriman, farmer (Manor Farm) on Village St. (Bradmore 2/1901). 1904 William Cumberland received £10 apprentice fee from Bunny & Bradmore charities, paid to Mr Parker. On electoral roll, house, 1910-1911. 1911 William Cumberland age 24 ag.lab. with wife Martha age 22 born Ruddington 1889 (married 3 years (1908) with 2 children), Edward 3 born

Somercotes Derby and Minnie 1 born Bradmore, at Church St., Ruddington. (William and Martha's marriage not found.)

Rose Ellen Cumberland, born 4.2.1889, Bradmore, bapt. 20.11.1889, daughter of Edward and Mary. 1891 age 3 in parents' house (Bradmore 1891/24). Methodist Sunday School scholar Vestry Girl 9.4.1893, gap, sick 8.10.1893, continued 14.1.1894 – Dec.1895, 3rd class Jan.1896-June 1898, 2nd class July 1898-June 1901. 1901 age 12 living in parents' house (Bradmore 10/1901). 1901 received 'Family Friend, Band of Hope, The Adviser' from the Sunday School, 1st class July 1901-29.11.1903 and occasionally to 1.5.1904. 1908 Apr.qtr. Rose Ellen Cumberland married Frank Sutcliffe, son of Joseph, coal miner, and Emma of Alfreton, Belper district. 1911 Frank Sutcliffe age 27 collier contractor born Alfreton 17.10.1883, with wife Ann 22 born Bradmore married 2 years with 1 child, Doris age 2 born Alfreton, at 5 Queens Head Yard, Alfreton, 2-room house.

Sarah Cumberland born c1828, Willoughby. 1861 age 33, seamstress, married to John son of William and Sarah, second wife (Bradmore 1861/40). Buried Bunny 24.4.1866 age 39.

Sarah Cumberland born c1852, Keyworth, possibly daughter of John and Sarah, otherwise of John and Ann. 1861 age 9 in parents' house (Bradmore 1861/40). 1871 Sarah Cumberland age 17 born Keyworth servant for John Cripwell age 67 farmer of 119 acres at Barton, Notts. Married at Bunny 26.2.1877, daughter of John, labourer, to William Gash age 21, labourer of Harrowby, Grantham, son of Henry, labourer and Elizabeth (who died before 1871). William Gash born June qtr. 1857, died Oct.qtr. 1879, Grantham district. 1881 Sarah Gash age 28 born Keyworth, single, domestic servant for Samuel Turner grocer and baker at 2 Norton St, Spittlegate, Lincolnshire.

William Cumberland bapt. Bunny 10.3.1821, son of William, cottager, and Sarah of Bradmore. 1851 William age 28, wheelbarrow labourer born Bradmore, with wife Elizabeth age 33 born Willoughby, lace worker and children Ann 9 lace worker, John 7 scholar and William 1 all born Cropwell Bishop, at Cropwell Bishop. 1861 William age 40 ag.lab., wife Elizabeth age 43 and son Thomas 9 born Cropwell Bishop, at Cropwell Bishop. 1871 William age 50 ag.lab with wife Elizabeth age 50 at 6 Parker Row, Cropwell Bishop. 1881 age 61, ag.lab., with wife Elizabeth age 63, at Cropwell Bishop. Elizabeth Cumberland died Oct.qtr. 1887, Bingham district. 1891 William age 69 widower, ag.lab., living alone at Cropwell Bishop. William Cumberland born 1820 died Jan. qtr. 1899, Bingham district.

? Cumberland, bapt. Bunny 4.2.1823 daughter of William, labourer, and Sarah of Bradmore.

Jane Cumberland bapt. Bunny 25.3.1825, daughter of William, labourer, and Sarah of Bradmore.

Elizabeth Cumberland bapt. 22.8.1827, daughter of William, cottager, and Sarah of Bradmore, buried 22.4.1829 age 1 year.

Jane Cumberland born c1788, Co. Meath? Ireland, widow of Sam Attewell, married William Cumberland at Bunny 3.12.1832, 2nd wife. 1841 age 50 married to William. 1851 age 64, married to William (Bradmore 1851/21). 1861 married to William (Bradmore 1861/48). Jane Cumberland died Jan qtr 1863, Basford district.

Matthew Cumberland born 27.5.1792, Bradmore, bapt. Bunny 28.5.1792, son of Matthew, cottager, and Elizabeth. Buried as infant, Bunny, 24.2.1794.

Elizabeth Cumberland born 18.12.1794, Bradmore, bapt. Bunny 24.12.1794, daughter of Matthew, cottager, and Elizabeth. Buried Bunny 27.7.1797.

Elizabeth Cumberland born 24.1.1799 Bradmore, bapt. Bunny 28.1.1799, daughter of Matthew, cottager, and Elizabeth. Her father Matthew's will, 1806, left her a legacy when she was 20.

Ann Cumberland of Bradmore, servant, married Richard Jackson labourer of Bradmore at Bunny 5.9.1853. See Richard Jackson.

Ann Cumberland daughter of John, labourer, and Ann of Bradmore bapt. as an adult at Bunny 15.6.1862. (If she is actually Ann daughter of John and Sarah, she would be age 20 at baptism.)

CURSHAW

William Curshaw born c1791. 1841 age 50, agricultural labourer, householder, married to Jane, in one of the cottages forming Nos.30/32 Main St. Household includes Rebecca Attewell (Bradmore 1841/45).

Jane Curshaw born c1791. 1841 age 50, married to William (Bradmore 1841/45).

CUSWORTH

Elizabeth Cusworth nee Christian, born 1858 Bradmore daughter of Gideon and Mary. Jul.qtr. 1886 Basford district Elizabeth married Josep Cusworth, railway plate layer son of John, mason's labourer and Hannah of Wath upon Dearne, Yorks. 1891 Elizabeth age 33 born Bradmore married to Joseph 44, canal labourer with children, John G 3, Alfred Christian 9 mths both born Wath, at 19 High St., Wath

upon Dearne. 1894 July qtr. Rotherham district, Joseph Cusworth died. 1895 Apr.qtr. Nottingham district, Elizabeth Cusworth married to William Edwin Mugliston. See Mugliston.

Thomas Cutler, tailor of Bradmore. Admon. 29.4.1696. Inventory 25.3.1696 by Thomas Blatherwicke and John Walker, including: purse and apparell £1; 9 sheep £2/14/-; bedstead and linen 11/-; a heiffer and a foal 4/-; implements 9/-; total £4/11/-. Bond 25.4.1696.
